

Focus on Continuous Improvement

Capital Improvement Department

- Innovation Fridays monthly meeting for process improvements that leads to maximizing efficiency and productivity and delivering results
- Process Improvements continue to focus on staff (trainings, Lessons Learned, goal setting, ownership philosophy), internal procedure standardization through procedures manual, community/stakeholder engagement, standardized reporting, vendor engagement, CIP monitoring (active management)

Streets and Maintenance


- Integration of the Parkland Management into the Streets and Maintenance Department provided opportunities for operational improvements and leverage of resources
- Over-seeding program at Westside Sports fields has been successful in maintaining game ready green fields year round
- New Pay As You Go programs for Street Resurfacing of Residential and Collector streets provide the City with a critical new tool for ongoing street improvements



Focus on Continuous Improvement

Sun Metro

- Completed conforming FTA documentation preparation and secured FTA grant for \$28.2M for construction of Montana RTS corridor and terminus at Far East Transfer Center, R. C. Poe/Edgemere.
- Implemented two additional RTS corridors, Alameda and Dyer, simultaneously in September 2019
 enhancing frequency and connectivity to three major areas of City.
- Executed **service adjustments** in conjunction with new RTS services to enhance system efficiency and sustainability.
- Initiated construction of citywide bus stop enhancements to improve accessibility in compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act.
- Procured Phase I of mobile fare payment application based on visual validation projected to be implemented in summer.
- Testing and coordinating with vendor an upgrade to Automated Vehicle Locator (AVL) system in order to improve data gathering and reporting, resulting in more comprehensive system analysis.


Since September 2019:

Design nearing completion for Schuster Reconstruction: Construction anticipated to begin spring 2020 and complete by spring 2021 Bicycle Connectivity Phase I has completed design and will soon begin construction. This project will provide citywide bicycle facilities to include bicycle boulevards and buffered, protected and shared lanes. Construction for Phase II to follow in fall 2020.







The construction for Far East Transfer
Center is set to begin this spring and open
to the public spring 2021. This terminal
will include waiting areas, drivers lounge
restrooms, bus bays for the Montana RTS
buses and local routes among other
amenities.



In the first six months of FY2020 pothole patching crews repaired 48,261 potholes; on pace to exceed previous year.

20 Streets Resurfaced in FY2020 (first half)

- 2012 Program **345** of **415** streets completed
- Arterial Program 7 of 8 Major Arterials substantially completed
- Residential Paving Program 41 streets completed





In the first six months of FY2020, street sweeping crews swept **12,935** curb miles of City streets


Similar to potholes, service request for street sweeping increase immediately after rain events



In the first six months of FY2020, refreshed lane lines on 170,005 linear feet of City streets

(32 lane miles; goal is 200 lane miles by Aug. 31)

In the first six months of FY2020, refreshed **24,540** linear feet of crosswalks on City streets (**4.6** linear miles)

Strategy: Improve competitiveness through infrastructure investments impacting the quality of life

Delivery of programmed Street Infrastructure projects:

- Continued work on the design and construction of the street reconstruction program with goal to complete by the end of 2022
- Completed 14 transportation projects including Mauer Road NTMP, Redd Road Median & Parkway
 Landscaping, University Pedestrian and Bicycle Enhancements, Deer Avenue NTMP, Glenwood Drive
 Improvements, Annie Reconstruction, Toni, Mary Jeanne, Yvonne Street and Drainage Improvements,
 etc.)
- City council approved \$3 Million additional funding for street resurfacing bringing a total of **\$10 Million** per year of dedicated pay as you go funding.
- Phase I of the **Top 25 Arterials** safety improvements is under construction and include Pellicano, Railroad, Cotton, George Dieter, Yarbrough and Lee Trevino. Phase II is under design and includes corridors: Airport, Executive Center, Pebble Hills, Redd Road (Phase II), Shadow Mountain, West Wind, Sunland Park and Vista Del Sol.



Strategy: Continue the strategic investment in City facilities

Street Operations

- Streets and Maintenance resources will be utilized to support the changing public works needs resulting from the COVID-19 emergency
- Resources being diverted to assist Environmental Services with anticipated increase in trash collection at citizen collection stations
- Pothole patching operations have surpassed historical trends to date with significant pothole repair activity in present fiscal year; this has been exacerbated by unseasonable precipitation and freeze events over the last few months



Strategy: Continue the strategic investment in City Facilities

Parkland Maintenance

- Higher maintenance levels at Westside Sports Complex and Blackie Chesher Designated Game Fields
- Increase the number of parks that have Centralized Computer controls to increase irrigation efficiency
- Starting new program for changeover of playground fall surfaces from sand to Engineered Wood Fiber to improve user safety



Strategy: Enhance regional comprehensive transportation system

Alameda and Dyer RTS service implemented in September 2019

Procured contract for bus stop enhancements – stop platforms and sidewalks for improved ADA accessibility.

Procured mobile pay and ridership tracking software improvements.

Kicked off 2nd year of Streetcar operation in conjunction with Winterfest.

Ongoing Northgate TOD coordination with Hunt Metro 31 group; including leasing of terminal retail areas





Key Opportunities/Challenges

Department/Area

Opportunities:

Sun Metro

Commence work on Montana RTS corridor construction due for service in Summer 2022.

Increase ridership and customer experience through enhanced real time route information and mobile card payment app also by Year-round service programing/large-scale events with city departments and community partners

Management structure change forthcoming in summer 2020 with full integration by FY2021.



Key Opportunities/Challenges

Department/Area	Opportunities:
Facility Maintenance	Many of the City's HVAC's, roofs, and electrical and plumbing systems are near or past their service life and need upgrade and replacement
Fleet Replacement	Citywide replacement of light and heavy vehicles is imperative in order to maintain present service levels (pick-up trucks, sedans, bucket trucks, patching units, street sweepers, animal transport vehicles, etc.)
Pavement Cut and Traffic Control Permits	Communication companies working on installing 5G's systems have created a challenge to maintaining pace of permitting and inspection of work
