2005-2010 CONSOLIDATED PLAN

The “Executive Summary” section of the June 26, 2007 Consolidated Plan Amendment on page 4 is expanded to add this Executive Summary.

The Consolidated Plan of the City of El Paso is the document submitted to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) that serves as a comprehensive housing affordability strategy, community development plan, and submission for funding under the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Program. On July 19, 2005, the City Council of the City of El Paso adopted its five-year (2005-2010) Consolidated Plan. The City Council for the City of El Paso first amended the 2005-2010 Consolidated Plan to comply with new HUD regulations that became effective March 13, 2006; amended the 2005-2010 Consolidated Plan for a second time on August 26, 2008 to add a Neighborhood Revitalization Strategy Area component that was approved by HUD on November 12, 2008; amended the 2005-2010 Consolidated Plan for a third time on November 18, 2008 to add a Neighborhood Stabilization Program component that was approved by HUD on January 26, 2009; and amended the 2005-2010 Consolidated Plan for a fourth time on May 5, 2009 to add a Homelessness Prevention and Rapid Re-Housing Program component that was recently submitted to HUD by the May 18, 2009 deadline.

The City of El Paso (“the City”) is currently amending its adopted Consolidated Plan for the period of September 1, 2008 to August 31, 2009 in order to add the Community Development Block Grant-Recovery (CDBG-R) Act Stimulus Program, authorized by Congress under the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 (Recovery Act). Title XII of Division A of the Recovery Act (Public Law 111-005, approved February 17, 2009) appropriates \$1 billion dollars to carry out the CDBG program under Title I of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974 (42 U.S.C. 5301, et seq.) (the HCDA) on an expedited basis. These funds will be distributed to grantees that received CDBG funding in Fiscal Year (FY) 2008 in accordance with the provisions of 42 U.S.C. 5306. The grant program under Title XII is commonly referred to as the CDBG Recovery (CDBG-R) program. This 2005-2010 Consolidated Plan Amendment to add the CDBG-R program also hereby incorporates an Amendment to the City’s 2008-2009 Annual Action Plan to add specific CDBG-R activities. Except as described in the Recovery Act, the statutory and regulatory provisions governing the CDBG program also apply to the CDBG-R program.

The intent of the Recovery Act is to enable local governments to carry out, on an expedited basis, eligible activities under the CDBG program that will:

- 1) Address current economic conditions;
- 2) Maximize job creation and economic benefit; and
- 3) Primarily invest in economic development, housing, infrastructure and public facilities

activities that will quickly spur further economic investment, increased energy efficiency, and job creation or retention.

Moreover, Title XII of Division A of the Recovery Act requires that, in selecting CDBG-R projects to be funded, recipients shall give priority to projects that can award contracts based on bids within 120 calendar days from the date the funds are made available to the recipients. Section 1602 of the Recovery Act also states that, when CDBG-R funds are being used for infrastructure investments, grantees must give preference to activities that can be started and completed expeditiously, including a goal to obligate at least 50 percent of the funds for activities that can be initiated within 120 days of enactment of the Recovery Act.

The following projects that are being recommended for CDBG-R funding constitute High and Medium Priority Need activities to be added to the 2008-2009 Annual Action Plan of the 2005-2010 Consolidated Plan of the City. They fall under the categories of Infrastructure and Job Creation and/or Retention.

For the purposes of this Amendment, the City will utilize CDBG-R funds and pursue the above-specified activities to give priority consideration and focus additional federal funds on projects that can be started and completed expeditiously to stimulate the economy through HUD-approved measures, specified in the last paragraph of page 4. These projects were also primarily selected because they meet two of the three fundamental National Objectives of HUD: To create a suitable living environment and to create economic opportunities. Finally, these projects have been selected based on the following HUD criterion which follows the intent of the Recovery Act. The required elements in the CDBG-R substantial amendment to the annual action plan for entitlement communities, Insular Areas, and non-entitlement counties in Hawaii are:

- 1) Pursuant to 24 CFR 91.220(d), (e) and (l), a description of the activities the jurisdiction will undertake with these funds to address priority needs and objectives. 24 CFR 91.220(l)(ii) is waived. The grantee shall instead identify any other Recovery Act funding to be used in conjunction with each activity and total activity budget from all funding sources. In addition, grantees must provide information concerning CDBG-R assisted activities in an electronic spreadsheet provided by HUD. The information that must be reported in the spreadsheet includes activity name, activity description, CDBG-R dollar

amount budgeted, eligibility category, national objective citation, additional Recovery Act funds for the activity received from other programs, and total activity budget.

- 2) A description of how the distribution and uses of the grantee's CDBG-R funds will meet the requirements of Title XII of Division A and Section 1602 of the Recovery Act: that, in selecting projects to be funded, recipients shall give priority to projects that can award contracts based on bids within 120 calendar days from the date the funds are made available to the recipients; and that for CDBG-R funds being used for infrastructure investments, recipients shall give preference to activities that can be started and completed expeditiously, including a goal of using at least 50 percent of the funds for activities that can be initiated not later than 120 calendar days after February 17, 2009.
- 3) For each activity, a written description of how the use of CDBG-R funds for the activity will maximize job creation and economic benefit in relation to the CDBG-R funds obligated, and will address the Recovery Act, by:
  - (a) Preserving and creating jobs and promoting economic recovery;
  - (b) Assisting those most impacted by the recession;
  - (c) Providing investment needed to increase economic efficiency;
  - (d) Investing in transportation, environmental protection, or other infrastructure that will provide long-term economic benefits;
  - (e) Minimizing or avoiding reductions in essential services; or
  - (f) Fostering energy independence
- 4) For each activity, the number of full- and part-time jobs estimated to be created and retained by the activity (including permanent, construction and temporary jobs).
- 5) A description of the activities that will be carried out with CDBG-R funds that promote energy conservation, smart growth, green building technologies, or reduced pollution emissions.
- 6) Information on how to contact grantee program administrators, so that citizens and other interested parties know who to contact for additional information.

Attachment A-2, Required Elements of the CDBG-R Substantial Amendment, contains specific information regarding the six required elements outlined above for each of the five projects recommended for CDBG-R funding.

Although the City was eligible to use up to 10% of the CDBG-R Program funds for administration, no portion of the CDBG-R has been allocated for this purpose. The City believes the intent of the CDBG-R stimulus funding is to fund project-specific activities that will stimulate the economy. Additional administration costs incurred by the City related to the CDBG-R Program will be minimal.

The process of adopting this Amendment is in compliance with HUD regulations governing amendments to the Consolidated Plan revised as of April 1, 2003, as follows, with the exception of (b) regarding the Citizen Participation Plan because HUD has waived some of the provisions regarding public comment, as explained on page 7, due to the expedient nature of this amendment:

Title 24 CFR PART 91 – CONSOLIDATED SUBMISSIONS FOR COMMUNITY PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMS, Subpart F – Other General Requirements, Section 91.505, Amendments to the Consolidated Plan.

- (a) Amendments to the plan. The jurisdiction shall amend its approved plan whenever it makes one of the following decisions:
  - (1) To make a change in its allocation priorities or a change in the method of distribution of funds;
  - (2) To carry out an activity, using funds from any program covered by the consolidated plan (including program income), not previously described in the action plan; or
  - (3) To change the purpose, scope, location, or beneficiaries of an activity.
- (b) Criteria for substantial amendment. The jurisdiction shall identify in its citizen participation plan the criteria it will use for determining what constitutes a substantial amendment. It is these substantial amendments that are subject to a citizen participation process, in accordance with the jurisdiction's citizen participation plan.
- (c) Submission to HUD. (1) Upon completion, the jurisdiction must make the amendment public and must notify HUD that an amendment has been made. The jurisdiction may submit a copy of each amendment to HUD as it occurs, or at the end of the program year. Letters transmitting copies of amendments must be signed by the official representative of the jurisdiction authorized to take such action.

Since the inception of the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program over thirty years ago, the City of El Paso has received over 300 million dollars in federal grants that have funded countless worthwhile programs and projects to improve the community development-eligible neighborhoods and quality-of-life for low- to moderate-income residents. The CDBG-R Grant is a special CDBG allocation authorized under the Recovery Act to respond to the current nation-wide economic crisis by investing in our local communities in a manner that furthers the intent of the CDBG program as envisioned by Congress and HUD.

According to a memorandum from the President of the United States, the Recovery Act is "an investment package designed to provide a necessary boost to our economy in these difficult times and to create jobs, restore economic growth, and strengthen America's middle class. The Recovery Act is designed to stimulate the economy

through measures that, among other things, modernize the Nation's infrastructure, jump start American energy independence, expand high-quality educational opportunities, preserve and improve access to affordable health care, provide middle-class tax relief, and protect those in greatest need. It is not intended to fund projects for special interests." Furthermore, the Recovery Act also states that "while grantees (local government entitlement recipients) have the full range of CDBG eligible activities at their disposal for CDBG-R, Congress clearly intends that CDBG-R funds should primarily be invested in economic development, housing, infrastructure and other public facilities activities that will quickly spur further economic investment, increased energy efficiency, and job creation or retention. Consequently, the activities selected for the CDBG-R Program of the City of El Paso will address problems associated with inadequate infrastructure and public facilities, as well as economic hardship for many of the residents of our community.

This Amendment will make it possible for CDBG-R activities to be a valuable and expeditious tool for economic development in the El Paso community through the creation of jobs, and can enhance ongoing efforts by the City of El Paso to achieve sustainable neighborhood infrastructure revitalization in a manner that also furthers two national objectives of HUD: to provide a suitable living environment, and facilitate expanding economic opportunity.

The five-year Consolidated Plan is designed to document and address identified housing and non-housing community needs and solutions for programs and services for low- and moderate-income and special populations in designated community development areas of the City of El Paso. Incorporation of CDBG-R program funded activities into the 2008-2009 Annual Plan and 2005-2010 Consolidated Plan through this Amendment adhere to the guiding principles of the Consolidated Plan.

### **Summary of Changes to the 2005-2010 Consolidated Plan**

This Consolidated Plan Amendment resulted from a letter to CDBG Grantees (including the City of El Paso, Texas) from Shaun Donovan, the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development's Secretary, dated May 5, 2009, announcing the availability of additional funding for the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program under the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 (Recovery Act). Also, HUD's website listed El Paso, Texas as an eligible Grantee for CDBG-R funding in the amount of \$2,284,192 under the "Community Development Block Grants" section and the "Allocations by State" link. The availability of such funding will compliment the City of El Paso's efforts to engage and proactively respond to the economic and infrastructure needs of the community at the neighborhood level.

Beginning in FY 2008, 2009, the City will utilize CDBG-R funds to implement a range of eligible CDBG activities that will foster economic growth and modernize El Paso's infrastructure. The City will construct two street and drainage improvements, provide street corner ADA curb cuts, facilitate the creation and retention of jobs, and provide access to economic opportunities that will lead to the creation of living wage jobs. The

activities specified in Attachment A-1 will also reduce the number of substandard flood-prone streets and ADA non-compliant sidewalks, while creating/retaining jobs and impacting neighborhoods and residents having the greatest need.

### Incorporation of Changes

This Amendment incorporates the following changes into the City of El Paso's adopted 2005-2010 Consolidated Plan and amends the 2008-2009 Annual Action Plan in accordance with HUD requirements:

### **Community Development Block Grant-Recovery Program Summary**

The CDBG-R Program is hereby added to the 2005-2010 Consolidated Plan for the City of El Paso, Texas, dated July 19, 2005 as Appendix 9. Eligibility Citations: Title XII of Division A of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009, which appropriates \$1 billion to carry out the CDBG program under Title I of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974 on an expedited basis. These funds will be distributed to grantees that received CDBG funding in (FY) 2008 in accordance with the provisions of 42 U.S.C. 5306. The Grant program under Title XII is commonly referred to as the CDBG Recovery (CDBG-R) program. Except as described in the Recovery Act, the statutory and regulatory provisions governing the CDBG program, found at 24 CFR part 570, subparts A, C, D, E, F, J, K, and O for CDBG entitlement communities, as appropriate, shall also apply to the CDBG-R Program.

### **Introduction**

The second paragraph of the Introduction section on page 1 is expanded to add, "HUD is only waiving the consolidated plan regulations on certification of consistency with the consolidated plan as they relate to the Citizen Participation process for the Community Development Block Grant-Recovery Program (CDBG-R). Conversely, HUD is creating a new set of certifications to ensure that CDBG-R funds will be used to meet the congressionally identified goals of the American Recovery and Investment Act of 2009 through the targeted activities set forth in this substantial amendment." This paragraph provides for expedited program implementation and implementation of statutory requirements unique to this appropriation.

### **Other Narrative**

The Other Narrative section on page 32 is expanded to add the subheading "Community Development Block Grant-Recovery Program (CDBG-R)" and the following narrative: "For the purposes of this Amendment, the City will utilize CDBG-R funds and pursue activities that are first and foremost able to meet two of the three fundamental national objectives of HUD: Create a suitable living environment and Create economic opportunities; and, secondly, are selected based on HUD criteria which follows the intent of the Recovery Act."

In addition to amending the 2005-2010 Consolidated Plan to add the CDBG-R component, the 2008-2009 Annual Action Plan is also hereby amended to add CDBG-R activities as specified in Attachment A-1, 2009-2012 CDBG-R Grant Budget, and in Attachment A-3, CDBG-R Activity Data Spreadsheet, that contains additional information such as the applicable Eligibility Citation and National Objective for each project. The required, signed and dated CDBG-R Certifications, signed and dated SF-424, and the CDBG-R Submission Template and Checklist are also attached. The City is also complying with the additional requirement of submitting Attachment A-3, the spreadsheet provided by HUD to submit information concerning CDBG-R assisted activities to HUD electronically. Furthermore, this Amendment serves as the City's application to the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) to receive \$2,284,192 in CDBG-R funding beginning in FY 2008-2009."

Also added as a subsequent paragraph is, "Information regarding the two street and drainage improvement projects listed in the proposed CDBG-R activities on page 2 will be submitted to the local Rio Grande Council of Governments (in conjunction with the submission of this Amendment to HUD) pursuant to Executive Order 12372 for review and recommendation as is standard procedure for all projects involving water and sewer facilities-related public works projects."

Advertised 7-Day Public Comment Period and Public Hearing to Receive Public Comment Regarding the Draft 2005-2010 Consolidated Plan Amendment, to add an CDBG-R component, and to amend the 2008-2009 Annual Action Plan to add CDBG-R Activities

A Draft of the current 2005-2010 Consolidated Plan Amendment to add a CDBG-R component, as well as to amend the 2008-2009 Annual Action Plan to add CDBG-R activities, was made available to the general public in the Department of Community and Human Development on the 8<sup>th</sup> Floor of City Hall in El Paso, Texas, and at the main public library and at all public library branches, as well as at the El Paso Community College and the University of Texas at El Paso libraries for a 7-day period beginning on May 18, 2009. The notice of the availability of the draft was advertised in English in the El Paso Times newspaper, and in Spanish in the El Diario newspaper, both on May 18, 2009. The requirement that the City of El Paso adhere to its citizen participation plan for substantial amendments was waived by HUD to shorten the usual public comment period to 7 calendar days due to time constraints. The following written comments were submitted by Luis A. Salazar on May 21, 2009 during the comment period: "I object to giving \$100K to Project ARRIBA. It is non-transparent. It denied me: job description/job specifications, hiring procedures, access to its personnel policies and its personnel committee in the matter of my applying for CEO. I was told by the Chief Info Officer that Project ARRIBA did not have to provide me with such info, even if it did have federal, state, city/county funds! And it did not! I was referred to the web site for info. It wasn't there either! The Info Chief became CEO! I plead the CDA direct Project ARRIBA to provide the requested info to me and make it available to the public." These comments were duly considered by the City Council of the City of El Paso prior to approval of the substantial amendment. The City also posted its substantial amendment materials on

the official City of El Paso website as the materials were developed, published, and submitted to HUD. These amended requirements have been followed for this 2005-2010 Consolidated Plan Amendment to add the CDBG-R component, and to add CDBG-R activities under the 2008-2009 Annual Action Plan.

### Priority Needs Analysis

The “Priority Needs Analysis and Strategies (91.215(a))” section on pages 10 and 11 of the 2005-2010 Consolidated Plan has been followed, including alternative requirements allowed by HUD (explained above), due to the expedited nature of the amendment. The Community Development Needs table on pages 131 to 133 of the 2005-2010 Plan does not need to be expanded to accommodate this Amendment because the Community Needs listed for all of the planned projects are already rated as “high priority” in the existing table.

### Goals and National Objective

The Consolidated Plan is designed to document and address identified housing and non-housing community needs related to the creation of a suitable living environment, the provision of decent housing, and the creation of economic opportunities for low- and moderate-income and special populations in designated community development areas of the City of El Paso. The CDBG-R activities, as explained in this Amendment and identified in detail in Attachment A-1, adhere to the guiding principles of the Consolidated Plan and of the strategic goals and priorities contained in the “Statement of Strategic Goals” section of the June 26, 2007 Consolidated Plan Regulatory Amendment on pages 7-10. Finally, the CDBG-R activity Eligibility Citations specified in Attachment A-3 verify that 100% of the CDBG-R program grant will benefit persons of low-and moderate income and persons that meet a HUD presumed benefit definition, as well as neighborhoods that are eligible under HUD guidelines.

Response:

All of the infrastructure investment construction projects recommended for funding using CDBG-R funds will meet the above-specified criteria. As mandated, the City is giving preference to activities that can be started and completed expeditiously. At least 50% of the recommended CDBG-R funded activities are planned for activities that can be initiated not later than 120 calendar days after February 17, 2009.

CENTRO MAYAPAN, INC. PROJECT: Retaining Jobs through Centro Mayapan Festival Marketplace

Centro Mayapan, Inc., a for-profit entity, is a community-based enterprise located in South-Central El Paso established to expand the economic base of the Chamizal community. The proposed project addresses the severe problem and need for the retention of economic opportunities for low- and moderate-income Spanish-speaking women and their families in the El Paso area, with an emphasis on the CBDO service area. On May 1, 2009, El Puente CDC inaugurated the opening of Centro Mayapan, an Incubator entity comprised of small businesses, social enterprises and micro-entrepreneurs, for the purpose of creating jobs for low-and moderate-income community members in the El Paso area, especially those living within the CBDO service area. CDBG-R funds will be used in retaining 25 entry-level staff positions in Centro Mayapan. Persons occupying the positions will be residents of El Puente's CDBO service area.

4. Project Arriba Advance Retraining and Redevelopment Initiative in Border Areas Economic Improvements:

Preserve and create jobs and promote economic recovery and economic efficiency. Assist those most impacted by the recession. Provide investment needed to increase economic efficiency. **At least 50 low income program participants will have access to economic opportunities. Of the 50 participants, 16 will be placed into living wage jobs per year over a 3-year period (48 jobs).**

PROJECT A.R.R.I.B.A (Advance Retraining and Redevelopment Initiative in Border Areas)  
PROJECT: Project ARRIBA

The proposed project is a Public Service project that addresses the increasing unemployment rate in the El Paso area, 8.2% as per February 2009 Texas compared to 8.9 % nationally, according to the Texas Workforce Commission. As a workforce development initiative, the Project ARRIBA program facilitates a college education for low income individuals through intense case management that connects them to wrap around supportive services (e.g. assistance with

tuition, childcare, transportation, etc.) and direct training (soft skills needed in the job sector). With a one year CDBG-R funding, Project ARRIBA will train 50 low income participants and report training performance results to the City of El Paso for a 3-year period. The agency projects that of the 50 trainees, 16 of trainees will complete the training and will be job placed into living wage jobs each year for a total of 48 job placements for the 3-year period.

5. Citywide Curb Cut Demand Program (CDBG-R) Construction:
