Throughout the 2020–2025 Consolidated Plan, the City of El Paso remained committed to improving the quality of life for low- and moderate-income residents through essential public services and facility improvements. Efforts focused on homelessness prevention, access to health and behavioral health care, support for youth and seniors, assistance for individuals with disabilities, park improvements, ADA improvements, food infrastructure, neighborhood infrastructure and minor repairs. Using CDBG, HOME, ESG, HOPWA, HHSP, and ARPA funds, the City and its partners provided vital programs and projects that stabilized households, promoted self-sufficiency, and strengthened the local continuum of care. The following section summarizes progress made during the fifth and final year of the Consolidated Plan and highlights overall accomplishments across the five-year period.

During 2024–2025, the City advanced its goals by supporting a network of programs focused on homelessness prevention, emergency shelter, case management, family services and infrastructure improvements. Through partnerships with local agencies and the coordination of CDBG, HOME, ESG, HHSP, HOPWA, and ARPA resources, the City improved access to critical services and strengthened collaboration across the service system. Initiatives such as El Paso Helps and the HEART pilot enhanced coordination between outreach, health, and housing programs. Overall, the City met its Consolidated Plan commitments and built a more connected, responsive network to support residents' stability and well-being.

The City faced significant challenges during the 2020–2025 Consolidated Plan period due to the lasting impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic and the economic recession that followed. These conditions required the City to adjust its strategic priorities from long-term economic development goals to immediate community stabilization efforts. Resources were redirected to help residents remain housed, fed, and supported with essential services. While this shift temporarily limited progress in some economic development activities, it strengthened the City's capacity to respond to emergencies, improved coordination among partner agencies, and laid the groundwork for a more resilient and adaptive service delivery system moving forward.

Assess how the jurisdiction's use of funds, particularly CDBG, addresses the priorities and specific objectives identified in the plan, giving special attention to the highest priority activities identified.

The City of El Paso used its CDBG funds to address the highest priorities identified in the Consolidated Plan and Community Needs Assessment, focusing on improving the quality of life for low- and moderate-income residents. CDBG supported programs that helped prevent homelessness, provided food and basic needs assistance, and expanded access to health, youth, and shelter services for individuals and families in need.

Under Public Facilities, three park improvements - Pueblo Viejo Park Improvements, J.P. Shawver Handball Court and Tom Lea Lower Park Dog Run. Pueblo Viejo Park Improvements included the installation of new playground equipment, new canopy over new playground equipment, engineered wood fiber, and the construction of a concrete ramp to provide accessibility to the playground area. J.P. Shawver Handball Court included the installation of a 3-wall handball court and solar lighting. Tom Lea Lower Park Dog Run included the installation of chain link fence, gate for pedestrian access and maintenance access, sidewalk at the entrance of the dog run, drinking fountain pet friendly and new bench with concrete pad. Three ADA projects - Sidewalks along Barney St, Sidewalks along Flower Dr, and Wheelchair Ramps at Lakehurst Rd and Saratoga Dr. Sidewalks along Barney St included the installation of 170 linear feet of sidewalk and curb cuts. Sidewalks along Flower Dr included the installation of 365 linear feet of sidewalk and curb cuts. Wheelchair Ramps at Lakehurst Rd and Saratoga Dr included the installation of ADA ramps at 12 corners along Lakehurst Rd and Saratoga Dr. One Food Infrastructure Improvement - El Pasoans Fighting Hunger Food Bank Teaching Kitchen. El Pasoans Fighting Hunger Food Bank Teaching Kitchen included the installation of permanent commercial and industrial appliances and equipment, upgrades to plumbing, water, electrical, gas, HVAC and venting. One Neighborhood Improvements - PdN Children's Inclusive Learning Center East Campus. PdN Children's Inclusive Learning Center East Campus included the new construction of an inclusive early learning center with eight classrooms that will provide early childcare, and early child education to children with disabilities in an inclusive environment with children who have no disabilities. One Abused/Neglected Children Improvement - EPCGC Renovation and Expansion. EPCGC Renovation and Expansion included counseling rooms, parent child interactive therapy rooms, group counseling rooms, children play area, multipurpose room, and TAS Compliant Restrooms. These improvements provide novel and improved amenities to residents, and it is another example of how the City has leveraged other projects in the surrounding neighborhoods to amplify what has been carried out under the CDBG program.

Under HOME and CDBG RLF, 11 households were assisted under Single-Family Owner-Occupied Program.

Following the COVID-19 pandemic and the economic challenges that followed, the City prioritized the use of funds to help residents remain stable rather than investing in new economic development projects. This approach ensured that resources reached those most affected by

financial hardship, rising housing costs, and limited access to essential services. By coordinating CDBG with ESG, HHSP, HOPWA, and ARPA resources, the City strengthened local service delivery and maintained continuity across partner agencies. Overall, the City's use of funds aligned with its goals to protect vulnerable households, improve access to services, and support community recovery. Narrative

During the 2024–2025 program year, the City of El Paso provided assistance to low- and moderate-income households through programs supported by CDBG, HOME, ESG, HOPWA, HHSP, and ARPA funds. The majority of households served identified as Hispanic or Latino, consistent with the overall population of the City of El Paso. Families assisted also included individuals identifying as White, Black or African American, Asian, American Indian or Alaska Native, and Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander, as well as both Hispanic and non-Hispanic households. All programs were implemented in compliance with HUD fair housing and nondiscrimination requirements to ensure that assistance was provided equitably and accessible to all eligible residents regardless of race or ethnicity. Some individuals served identified as "Other" or "Multiracial," which is not a selectable category within the IDIS reporting table. For accurate reporting and to ensure all beneficiaries were accounted for, these individuals were included under the "White" category. A total of 34 persons identified as "Other/Multiracial," including 2 individuals served under HOPWA and 32 individuals served under CDBG-funded programs.

Narrative

Rebuilding Together is a volunteer-driven program dedicated to enhancing the safety, accessibility, and

overall livability of homes for eligible residents in El Paso, specifically focusing on elderly individuals and residents with disabilities. Through this program, volunteers work to create safer and more suitable living environments, which significantly improve the quality of life for those who may face mobility challenges or live on fixed incomes.

Each project is capped at \$4,999 per address, ensuring a wide reach within the community. Renovations under the program include critical improvements, such as roof repairs and replacements to prevent leaks and structural damage, as well as bathroom upgrades, such as tub-to-shower conversions, which make bathing safer and easier for residents with limited mobility. Additionally, accessibility modifications, such as the installation of grab bars and ramps, are added to support the independence and safety of residents in their homes.

Leveraging

The City of El Paso leveraged its federal entitlement programs with state, local, and private resources to address the priorities identified in the Consolidated Plan. CDBG, ESG, HOPWA, HOME, and ARPA funds were coordinated with local general fund contributions and the state-funded Homeless Housing and Services Program (HHSP) to expand essential services and support community stabilization. Partner agencies also contributed private donations, volunteer hours, and in-kind services to enhance program delivery and extend assistance to additional residents.

Neither the HOME nor HHSP programs required a local match in El Paso; however, both were used strategically to complement ESG and CDBG activities. This coordination allowed the City to align funding across programs, sustain critical services, and maintain continuity of care for vulnerable populations. Publicly owned facilities such as parks, ADA infrastructure, food infrastructure and neighborhood facilities were also used to deliver programs and outreach activities. Through these combined efforts, the City maximized the impact of available resources and ensured that federal investments addressed the community's highest priorities.

The City's overhaul of the Single Family Owner Occupied Program process, combined with a local shortage of qualified contractors, resulted in 11 projects completed.

The El Paso housing market, characterized by high demand and low supply, led to increased purchase prices. Despite HUD's allowance of a higher purchase price for single-family homes, moderate-income

households, especially first-time homebuyers, were largely excluded due to rising sales prices. Limited available stock within the income guidelines exacerbated this issue. Homes for sale often required repairs, and with multiple offers on a limited supply, sellers preferred as-is offers, making it challenging to support first-time homebuyers, resulting in 0 first-time homebuyers closing on a home.

Discuss how these outcomes will impact future annual action plans.

Anticipated outcomes in future annual action plans will be adjusted to align with modifications to the City's anticipated in the First Time Home Buyer Program and Single Family Owner Occupied programs. The demand for affordable rental units among low-income residents in El Paso exceeds the current supply, and this gap is expected to widen significantly by 2025. The city consistently reevaluates its approach to maximize the impact of HOME funds.

To address the critical need identified in the El Paso Regional Housing Plan, the city commenced the development and rehabilitation of multi-family affordable rental housing in November 2023. This initiative, kickstarted through a Notice of Funding Availability, garnered substantial interest from the local community of affordable housing developers. This collaborative effort will lead to the construction and renovation of 258 affordable rental housing units, marking an unprecedented local investment in affordable housing. It also serves as a model for the strategic deployment of HUD funds to address ongoing affordable housing needs in El Paso.

During the 2024–2025 program year, the City of El Paso continued implementing coordinated strategies to reduce and end homelessness through outreach, shelter support, prevention, and housing stabilization efforts. Using CDBG, ESG, HHSP, HOPWA, and ARPA funds, the City partnered with local nonprofit agencies and regional systems of care to expand outreach to individuals and families experiencing homelessness and to maintain access to emergency and supportive housing options throughout the community. Through the El Paso Helps system and coordinated outreach led by the Opportunity Center for the Homeless, Amistad, and the HEART and Mobile Integrated Health teams, unsheltered individuals were engaged where they live and connected to immediate services. These multidisciplinary teams provided assessments, transportation, and referrals to shelter, behavioral health care, and case management, ensuring that persons encountered through street outreach were quickly linked to resources appropriate to their needs.

Addressing the emergency shelter and transitional housing needs of homeless persons

The City supported emergency shelter operations with ESG, CDBG, ARPA and related services through ESG and HHSP funding. These programs sustained capacity within local shelters to provide safe, low-barrier environments for individuals and families in crisis while supporting case management, intake, and navigation services that help participants stabilize and access longer-term solutions. Transitional housing and rapid rehousing options were coordinated with community partners to maintain a consistent flow from crisis response to permanent housing.

Helping low-income individuals and families avoid becoming homeless, especially extremely low-income individuals and families and those who are: likely to become homeless after being discharged from publicly funded institutions and systems of care (such as health care facilities, mental health facilities, foster care and other youth facilities, and corrections programs and institutions); and, receiving assistance from public or private agencies that address housing, health, social services, employment, education, or youth needs

Prevention efforts focused on assisting households facing eviction or severe cost burdens. The City worked with nonprofit partners to provide rental, utility, and case-management support to extremely low-income residents. Coordination with hospitals, mental-health providers, and correctional facilities helped identify individuals at risk of homelessness upon discharge and connect them to available

resources. The City also worked with agencies providing employment, education, and social services to promote stability and self-sufficiency among vulnerable households

Helping homeless persons (especially chronically homeless individuals and families, families with children, veterans and their families, and unaccompanied youth) make the transition to permanent housing and independent living, including shortening the period of time that individuals and families experience homelessness, facilitating access for homeless individuals and families to affordable housing units, and preventing individuals and families who were recently homeless from becoming homeless again

Through partnerships with several non profits, and several funding sources City promoted rapid rehousing and supportive housing programs that help shorten the time individuals and families experience homelessness. Case management and peer navigation services ensured continued follow-up to prevent returns to homelessness. Special attention was given to chronically homeless individuals, veterans, and youth exiting foster or institutional care, linking them to permanent housing, behavioral-health treatment, and ongoing supports that promote long-term stability.

Overall, the City of El Paso maintained progress toward its Consolidated Plan objectives by strengthening collaboration among service providers, improving access to coordinated entry and outreach systems, and directing resources toward prevention, stabilization, and recovery. These combined efforts contributed to measurable reductions in street homelessness, improved service coordination, and increased pathways to permanent housing across the community.

CR-30 - Public Housing 91.220(h); 91.320(j)

Actions taken to address the needs of public housing

For this reporting period, the City of El Paso continues to provide Consolidated Plan certifications of consistency for HOME projects and proposals and for its Annual/Five-Year Plan submission. HOME has continued the extensive rehabilitation of its properties, as well as the construction of new properties through various local, state, and federal mechanisms.

Actions taken to encourage public housing residents to become more involved in management and participate in homeownership

HOME promotes resident involvement through the following activities and programs:

- Health fairs
- Flu shots at properties where the majority of residents are elderly
- Homeownership preparation
- Budgeting guidance over the phone
- Family self-sufficiency activities
- Scholarship assistance
- Monthly food distribution for the elderly

Actions taken to provide assistance to troubled PHAs

The City only has one PHA, Housing Opportunities Management Enterprises (HOME) and it is a high performer.

The City of El Paso is working to reduce barriers to affordable housing by aligning land use and housing goals across departments. Efforts include reviewing zoning and subdivision standards, streamlining permitting processes, and maintaining fee waivers and incentives for affordable and infill development. The City continues to coordinate with the Housing Authority and regional partners to ensure local policies support fair housing choice and the development of diverse housing options.

Actions taken to address obstacles to meeting underserved needs. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

The City of El Paso worked to address obstacles to meeting underserved needs through coordinated outreach, data-driven planning, and expanded partnerships. The El Paso Continuum of Care strengthened its Coordinated Entry system to prioritize households with the greatest needs and promote equitable access to housing and services. Using a Housing First approach, partners reduced barriers to entry and created new pathways from homelessness to stability.

Through initiatives such as El Paso Helps, the City improved coordination among outreach teams, behavioral health providers, and housing programs to better reach people disconnected from services. Data from HMIS, the Point-in-Time Count, and local assessments were used to

Actions taken to reduce lead-based paint hazards. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

Incorporated as standard practice in all City of El Paso DCHD contracts for the construction or rehabilitation of residential structures, all contractors and subcontractors are required to comply with provisions for the elimination of lead-based paint (LBP) hazards set forth in 24 CFR Part 35. All LBP testing, risk assessments, project designs and clearance testing are done by qualified contractors licensed by the State of Texas. The contractors conduct lead-based inspections using XRF (x-ray fluorescent) spectrum analysis. Their inspection reports include a list of occupants, Lead Inspection Report, Risk Assessment, XRF Lead Results, Laboratory results, Lead Project Design, Instrument calibration results, Lead Sampling Drawing, Certifications for the Lead Firm, the Lead Inspector, the Risk Assessor, Lead Abatement Project Designer, Laboratory, and the Spectrum Analyzer's radiation safety record. Lead Clearance testing is performed after completion of all abatement and/or Interim Control Activities.

Actions taken to reduce the number of poverty-level families. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

The City of El Paso focused on stabilizing low- and moderate-income households and reducing the

effects of poverty through coordinated public service programs. Using CDBG, ESG, HOPWA, HHSP, and ARPA funds, the City partnered with local nonprofits to provide rental and utility assistance, emergency shelter, and supportive services that helped families maintain housing and access employment and education opportunities.

Through the El Paso Helps system, residents were connected to wraparound supports including case management, workforce readiness, and financial literacy programs. These combined efforts reduced barriers to stability and helped families experiencing economic hardship access the resources needed to achieve long-term self-sufficiency.

Actions taken to develop institutional structure. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

The City of El Paso continued to prioritize the development of an effective and coordinated program delivery system for federally funded activities, particularly through the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) and Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) programs. Dedicated funding was provided to shelters and service providers to strengthen operations, enhance performance, and ensure consistent delivery of services to residents in need.

To address system gaps, the City worked closely with the El Paso Continuum of Care to improve coordination and support the ongoing operation of the Coordinated Entry system. This collaboration ensures that individuals and families experiencing homelessness are efficiently assessed and connected to appropriate housing and services. The use of the Vulnerability Index—Service Prioritization Decision Assistance Tool (VI-SPDAT) continues to help identify those with the highest needs and match them with resources that promote stability and long-term housing success.

Actions taken to enhance coordination between public and private housing and social service agencies. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

The Community Needs Assessment (CNA) is the key tool for enhancing coordination among public and private housing and social service agencies in El Paso. It identifies the community's specific needs, fostering collaboration and ensuring effective resource allocation. By involving multiple agencies, the CNA provides a comprehensive understanding of local housing and social service needs, allowing for targeted strategies to fill service gaps and improve responses to homelessness. It also encourages ongoing communication and partnerships among agencies, leading to integrated services for vulnerable populations. Additionally, the El Paso Helps Collaborative enhances the CNA's efforts by uniting organizations to share resources and information, strengthening the city's overall response to housing challenges.

The City of El Paso continued implementing goals from the 2020 Analysis of Impediments to Fair Housing

Choice, which identified affordability and limited public awareness as the main barriers. The City maintained its Fair Housing website to improve access to information and complaint filing, continued tracking inquiries to monitor trends, and upheld ordinance updates that strengthen fair housing protections. Moving forward, the City will reassess its fair housing strategies while continuing to align with federal fair housing standards and address local affordability challenges.

The City of El Paso followed the standards established in its Citizen Participation Plan (CPP), to ensure residents had reasonable notice and opportunity to comment on the CAPER. A public notice announcing the report's availability was published in the El Paso Times and posted on the City's website, initiating a 15-day comment period. The draft CAPER was made available online and at the Department of Community and Human Development for public review. Residents were invited to provide feedback in writing, by email, or in person.

At the conclusion of the Consolidated Plan cycle, the CAPER was presented to City Council during a public hearing to provide additional opportunity for public comment and Council discussion before final submission to HUD. All comments received through the review and hearing process were considered in the final version of the report.

During the Consolidated Plan period, the City of El Paso adjusted several program objectives to respond to changing community needs and economic conditions. The COVID-19 pandemic and the subsequent rise in housing and living costs prompted a shift from long-term economic development activities to more immediate stabilization efforts, including homelessness prevention, rental assistance, access to essential services, and new or improved infrastructure.

These experiences highlighted the importance of flexibility in program design and stronger coordination among local partners. As a result, the City plans to continue aligning CDBG, HOME, ESG, HOPWA, HHSP, and ARPA resources toward integrated service delivery while gradually reinvesting in neighborhood revitalization and economic opportunity initiatives under the next Consolidated Plan cycle. This balanced approach will allow the City to sustain critical services while advancing long-term community stability.

Upon consolidating the 134 Durrill and 401 S Glenwood Single-Family Owner-Occupied projects, the City found that expenses were paid out locally but not drawn down in IDIS. As a result, a total of \$47,934.30 in HOME Program Income was drawn for the projects.

Additionally, \$1,613,661.16 in HOME Program Income was draw this program year for the construction of housing units. That said, the projects are not completed and will be reported in the upcoming year.

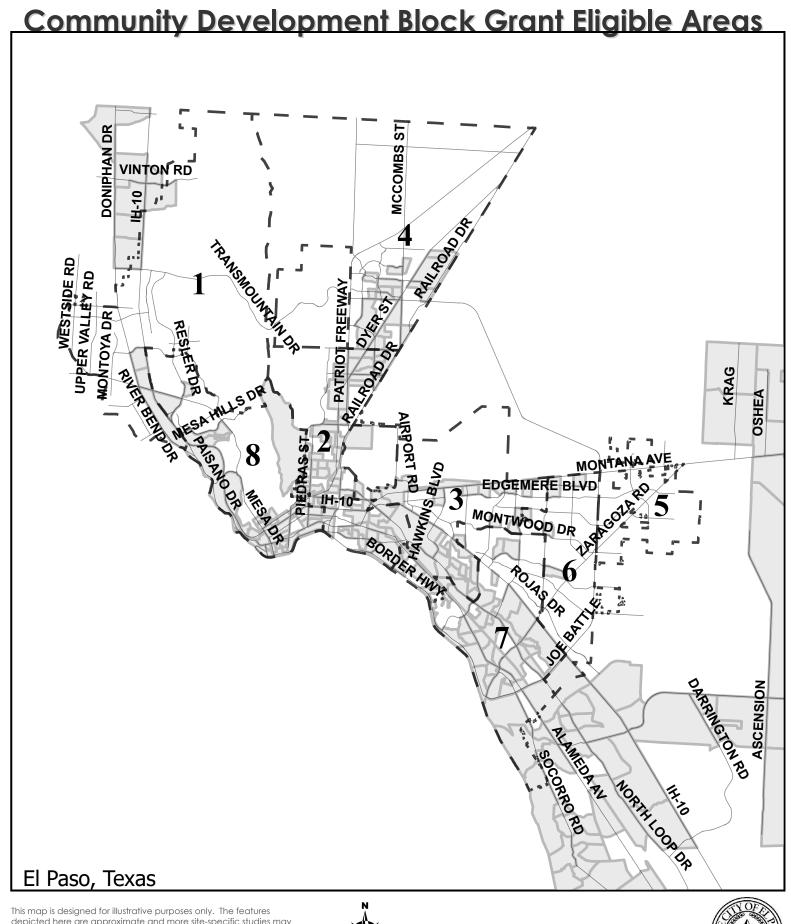

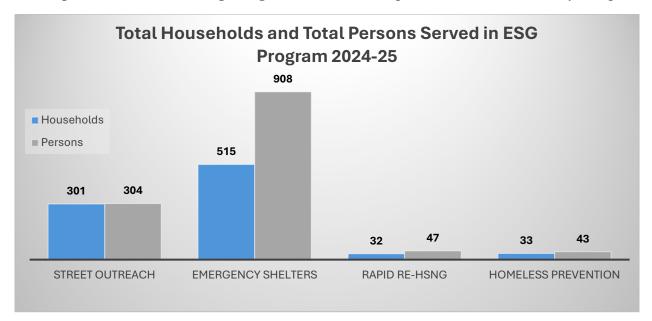

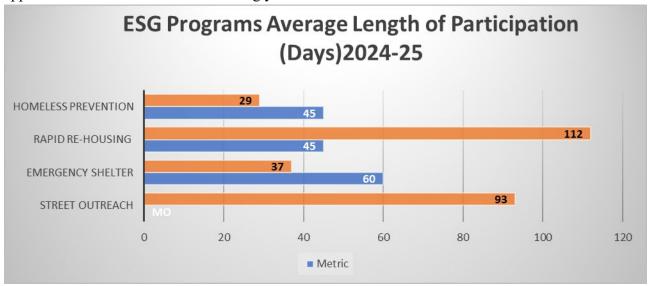
CR70 Graphs

The CR70 graphs present combined performance data for all ESG subrecipients, organized by program component. Derived from HMIS data, these graphs compare each component's actual performance against the Community Performance Plan (CPP) benchmarks. The components include Street Outreach (SO), Emergency Shelter (ES), Rapid Re-Housing (RRH), and Homeless Prevention (HP). Benchmarks for each program type were developed and approved by the CoC Performance and Benchmarks Committee.

The report is generated from the HMIS Administrative Annual Performance Report (APR) and the Consolidated Annual Performance and Evaluation Report (CAPER) submitted by each ESG subrecipient. HMIS consolidates and de-duplicates these submissions to create a unified dataset. The reporting period covers the monitoring year from **September 1, 2024, through August 31, 2025**, and is presented in a combined, by-component format.



The Length of Participation measures the average number of days a distinct household or individual receives services through an ESG-funded program, calculated from the program entry date to the exit date. For Street Outreach (SO), the Average Length of Stay benchmark will be monitored only (MO) and not evaluated as part of the Community Performance Plan (CPP) review process. Additionally, these metrics have not yet been approved for the 2024–2025 monitoring year.



HUD recognizes that Street Outreach (SO) programs primarily assist individuals in moving from unsheltered locations into Emergency Shelters (ES) or Transitional Housing (TH), rather than directly into permanent housing. Although placement into ES or TH is still considered a form of homelessness, HUD acknowledges that these transitions represent meaningful progress toward housing stability.

Emergency Shelters and Transitional Housing provide individuals with safe environments and connections to case managers who can assist with accessing permanent housing solutions and supportive services. In alignment with HUD's recommendations, the Performance Committee and CoC Board have determined that placements from street settings into shelters or transitional housing should be considered positive housing outcomes. Consequently, this has been adopted as an annual CPP benchmark specifically for Street Outreach programs.

During the 2024–2025 monitoring year, HUD clarified that while certain exit destinations are considered positive outcomes, they may still be categorized as Returns to Homelessness if they meet HUD's definitions. These positive exit destinations include:

Homeless Situations (ES):

- Emergency shelter or host home
- Hotel/motel paid by an emergency shelter voucher

Temporary Situations (TH):

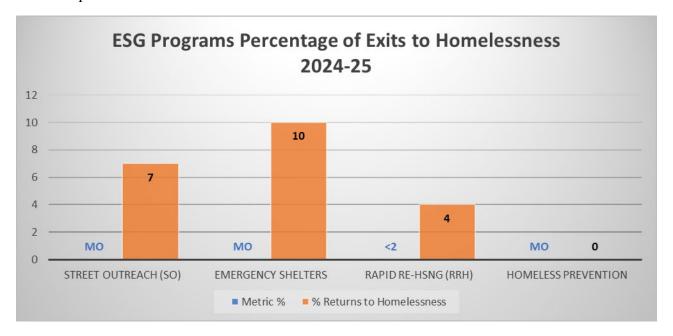
- Transitional housing programs, including those serving youth
- Hotel/motel paid by an emergency shelter voucher
- Living temporarily with family or friends

Institutional Situations:

- Foster care home or group home
- Psychiatric facility
- Substance abuse treatment or detox center
- Long-term nursing facility

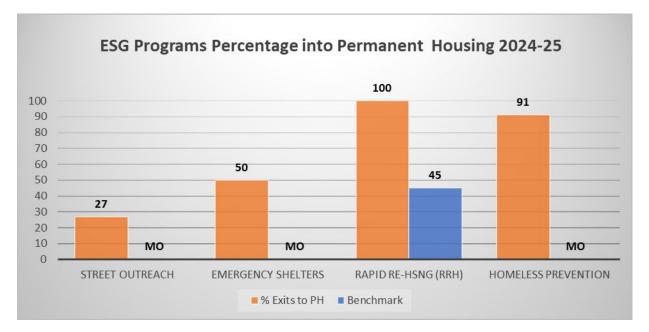
The Returns to Homelessness benchmark measures the percentage of program leavers who exited to a homeless or temporary destination out of the total number of program leavers. An exit destination is classified as a Return to Homelessness if it meets any of the following HUD-defined criteria:

- Emergency shelter, including hotels or motels paid for without an emergency shelter voucher
- Transitional housing for persons experiencing homelessness (including youth)
- A place not meant for human habitation



The Exits to Permanent Housing benchmark measures the percentage of distinct households that exited into permanent housing (PH)—including Rapid Re-Housing (RRH)—during the monitoring period. Permanent housing destinations include, but are not limited to:

- Rental by client with Rapid Re-Housing assistance or an equivalent subsidy, including Housing Choice Vouchers (HCV) (tenant- or project-based), Public Housing, or VASH
- Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH)
- Housing owned by the client, with or without an ongoing housing subsidy
- Rental by client, with or without a housing subsidy, including HCV (tenant- or project-based)
- Staying or living with family or friends on a permanent tenure basis

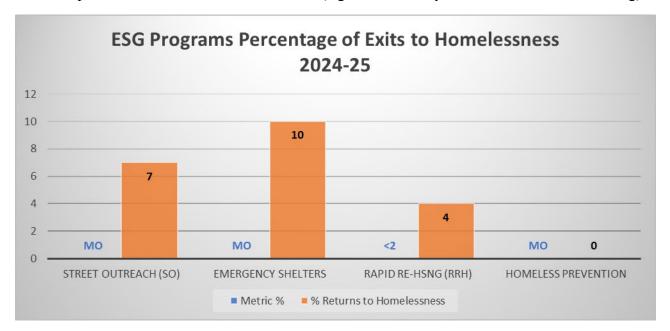


HUD recognizes that Street Outreach (SO) and Coordinated Entry (CE) programs often support individuals experiencing homelessness in transitioning to Permanent Housing (PH), Transitional Housing (TH), or Rapid Re-Housing (RRH). While placement into Emergency Shelter (ES) or Transitional Housing (TH) is still categorized as homelessness, HUD acknowledges that these transitions represent positive housing outcomes.

Emergency Shelters and Transitional Housing provide individuals with safe and stable environments where they can access case management, receive information about permanent housing opportunities, and connect to other critical services. These placements are therefore viewed as meaningful progress toward long-term housing stability.

The Returns to Homelessness benchmark measures the percentage of program leavers who exit to homeless or temporary destinations out of the total number of leavers. An exit destination is classified as a Return to Homelessness if it meets any of the following HUD-defined criteria:

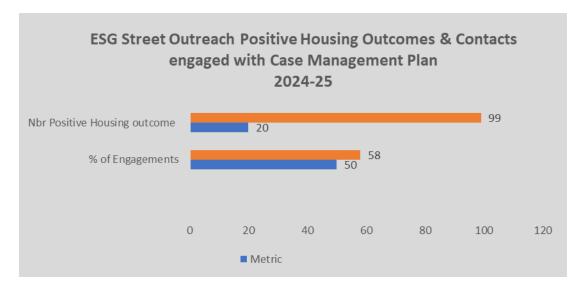
- Emergency shelter, including hotels or motels paid for without an emergency shelter voucher
- Transitional housing for persons experiencing homelessness (including youth)
- A place not meant for human habitation (e.g., vehicle, alley, street, or abandoned building)



Under federal strategy guidelines, placement into an Emergency Shelter (ES) is still classified as homelessness. However, HUD recognizes that such placements achieved through Street Outreach efforts represent a positive housing outcome. Emergency shelters offer individuals a safe environment and access to case management services that connect them to permanent housing options and other essential supports. In alignment with HUD's recommendations, the Performance Committee and CoC Board have determined that transitions from the street into shelter should be recognized as positive housing outcomes. Accordingly, the CoC Board has approved the Positive Housing Outcome as an annual CPP benchmark for Street Outreach programs only.

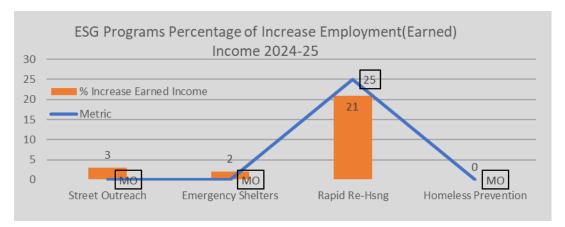
The Rate of Engagement benchmark measures the proportion of individuals who move from initial contact to active engagement in services. It is calculated by dividing the number of persons engaged (84) by the total number of street contacts (85) made during the reporting period.

A person is considered engaged when they actively participate in a case plan or receive supportive services such as meals, housing assistance, legal aid, or medical care. For the 2024–2025 monitoring year, the established benchmark is 30% of the total annual street contacts.

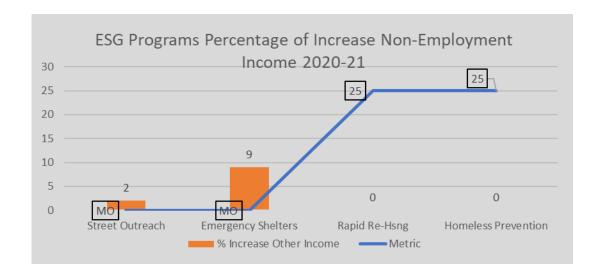


The Increase in Earned Income benchmark measures the percentage of adults who demonstrated an increase in earned income—that is, income from employment—between program entry and exit, or by the end of the reporting period for participants who have not

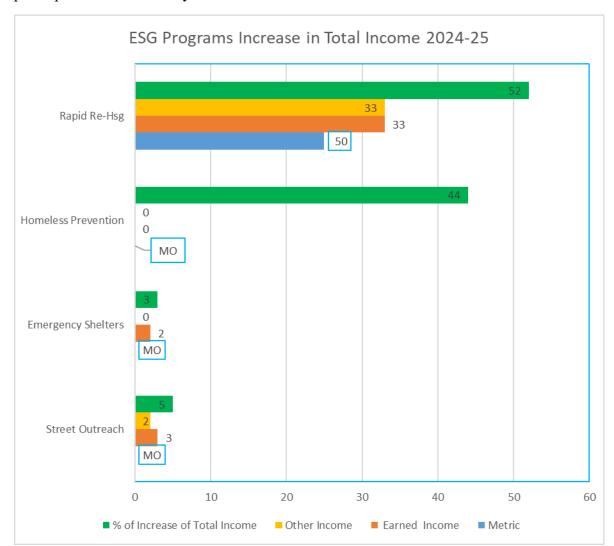
yet exited.



The Increase in Non-Employment Income benchmark measures the percentage of adults who experienced an increase in non-employment or other income sources between program entry and exit, or by the end of the reporting period for participants who have not yet exited.



The Increase in Total Income benchmark measures the percentage of all adults served during the reporting period—including those with no income at entry—who demonstrated an increase in employment, non-employment, or total income between program entry and exit, or by the end of the reporting period for participants who have not yet exited.



Federal strategies emphasize the importance of collecting data that is complete, comprehensive, and timely. Maintaining real-time data helps streamline the process of connecting individuals to emergency shelters, Coordinated Entry, and ultimately, permanent housing. The El Paso CoC has established a benchmark of four (4) days for entering and exiting client data in HMIS.

((1) A homeless individual with a disability as defined in section 401(9) of the McKinney-Vento Assistance Act (42 U.S.C. 11360(9)) who: a) lives in a place not meant for human habitation, a safe haven, or in an emergency shelter, and b) has been homeless and living as described for at least 12 months or on at least 4 separate occasions in the last 3 years, as long as the combined occasions equal at least 12 months and each break in homelessness separating the occasions included at least 7 consecutive night of not living as described; (2) An individual who has been residing in an institutional care facility, including jail, substance abuse or mental health treatment facility, hospital, or other similar facility, for fewer than 90 days and met all of the criteria of this definition before entering that facility; or (3) A family with an adult head of household (or, if there is no adult in the family, a minor head of household) who meets all of the criteria of this definition, including a family whose composition has fluctuated while the head of household has been homeless).)
Contractor	A contractor is an entity that receives a legal instrument (contract) by which a grantee or project sponsor purchases property or services needed to carry out the project or program under a Federal award. Household	A single individual or a family, as defined in 24 CFR 574.3. The term is used for collecting data on changes in income, changes in access to services, receipt of housing information services, and outcomes on achieving housing stability. Live-In Aides (see definition for Live-In Aide) and non-household members (e.g., a shared housing arrangement with a roommate) who resided in the unit are not reported in the annual performance report.
Improved HIV Viral Load	A reduction in the load or volume of HIV present in the HOPWA-eligible individual's blood at the end of the operating year compared to the beginning of the operating year. Most people with HIV/AIDS (PWH) who are engaged in medical care have routine laboratory tests. The HOPWA-eligible individual's two most recent laboratory reports can be used to determine viral load improvement, even if the first laboratory test was performed in a prior operating year.
In-kind Leveraged Resources	These are additional types of support provided to assist HOPWA-eligible individuals such as volunteer services, materials, use of equipment, and building space. The actual value of the support can be the contribution of professional services, based on customary rates for this specialized support, or actual costs contributed from other leveraged resources. In determining a rate for the contribution of volunteer time and services, use the criteria described in 2 CFR part 200. The value of any donated material, equipment, building, or lease should be based on the fair market value at time of donation. Related documentation can be from recent bills of sale, advertised prices, appraisals, or other information for comparable property similarly situated.

Leasing Costs	Costs used to lease all or a portion of a building as needed to provide housing to eligible households. Live-In Aide	obligated for the support of the person; and (3) would not be living in the unit except to provide the necessary supportive services. See 24 CFR 5.403 and the HOPWA Grantee Oversight Resource Guide for additional reference.
Master Leasing	Applies to the leasing of units of housing (scattered-sites or entire buildings) from a landlord by a nonprofit or public agency that subleases the units to HOPWA- eligible tenants. By assuming the tenancy burden, the agency facilitates housing of clients who may not be able to maintain a lease on their own due to poor credit, evictions, or lack of sufficient income.
Minimum Use Periods	Grantees that used HOPWA funding for new construction, acquisition, conversion, lease, or substantial rehabilitation of a building or structure are required to operate the building or structure for HOPWA-eligible individuals for a 10-year period. In the case of non-substantial rehabilitation or repair of a building or structure, the minimum use period is not less than 3 years. If no further HOPWA funds are used to support the facility, in place of completing the "CAP DEV" tab in the Performance Report Worksheet, the grantee must complete an "Annual Report of Continued Project Operation" throughout the required use periods. This report is found on the "STEWARD" tab of the Grantee Workbook.
Medically Assisted Living Facilities	HOPWA facility-based housing that assists residents with most or all activities of daily living, such as meals, bathing, dressing, and toileting. Regular medical care, supervision, and rehabilitation are also often available.
Operating Costs	Costs of operating a housing facility owned or leased by the grantee or project sponsor, to the extent the costs are necessary to house eligible households. Eligible operating costs include utilities, property insurance, minor repairs, and upkeep of the facility, maintenance both inside and outside the facility, procurement and contracting of services for facility operation or maintenance, furniture and appliances that will remain with the facility, food purchases and kitchen operation for HOPWA household at the facility, and staff time for directing any of the eligible operating costs mentioned above at the facility for eligible households (24 CFR §574.300(b)(8)).
Operating Year – Competitive grantees	HOPWA competitive grants are awarded for a 3-year period of performance with annual performance reports submitted for each of the 3 operating years. PHP can be used in conjunction with TBRA where PHP pays the security deposit and TBRA covers ongoing monthly rent payments starting with the first month. PHP must only be used to assist the client in entering permanent housing. PHP must never be used for monthly rent or on-going utility costs where a client is already in permanent housing. Although PHP is included as a supportive service under 24 CFR 574.300(b)(7), HUD has established a dedicated BLI for PHP to distinguish it from other supportive services.
Program Income	As defined in 2 CFR 200.1, program income is income earned by the grantee or project sponsor that is directly generated by a supported activity or earned as a result of the grant during the period of performance (except as provided by 2 CFR 200.307). See grant administration requirements on program income at 2 CFR 200.307 and the Federal award.
Project-Based Rental Assistance (PBRA)	A rental subsidy program that is tied to specific facilities or units owned or controlled by a project sponsor. Assistance is tied directly to the properties and is not portable or transferable.
Project Sponsor Organizations	Per HOPWA regulations at 24 CFR 574.3, any nonprofit organization or governmental housing agency that receives funds under a contract with the grantee to provide eligible housing and other support services or administrative services as defined in 24 CFR 574.300. Project Sponsor organizations are required to provide performance data on households served and funds expended.
Resource Identification	Resource identification funds may be used to establish, coordinate, and develop permanent housing assistance resources for eligible persons (including conducting preliminary research and making expenditures necessary to determine the feasibility of specific housing-related initiatives) (24 CFR § 574.300(b)(2)). Activities can include increasing coordination with local initiatives, systems, or strategies (such as the local Continuum of Care or Ryan White Planning Council) to house HOPWA-eligible individuals, development of new housing resources, and conducting community needs assessments to inform system design.
Rural	For purposes of HOPWA reporting, a rural county is a county in which: (1) Has no part of it within an area designated as a standard metropolitan statistical area by the Office of Management and Budget; or (2) is within an area designated as a metropolitan statistical area or considered as part of a metropolitan statistical area and at least 75% of its population is local on U.S. Census blocks classified as non-urban, or (3) is located in a state that has a population density of less than 30 persons per square mile (as reported in the most recent decennial census), and of which at least 1.25% of the total acreage of such State is under Federal jurisdiction.
Short-Term Rent, Mortgage, and Utility (STRMU) Assistance	Short-term rent, mortgage, and utility payments to prevent the homelessness of the tenant or mortgagor of a dwelling (24 CFR 574.300(b)(6)). Eligible STRMU costs include up to 21 weeks of the HOPWA-eligible individual's rent, mortgage, and/or utility costs, and the costs of staff time to review and determine household's need for STRMU assistance and make the STRMU payments. For the purposes of STRMU assistance, to the extent that taxes, insurance, condominium fees, or other building operation costs are included in the monthly mortgage payment either by federal regulation or the terms of the mortgage, these expenses are eligible to be included in the STRMU mortgage assistance payments. STRMU mortgage assistance for taxes, insurance, or condo fees that are not included on the monthly mortgage statement are not eligible.
Stewardship Units	Units developed with HOPWA, where HOPWA funds were used for acquisition, new construction, and/or rehabilitation that no longer receive operating subsidies from HOPWA. Report information for the units is subject to the 3-year use agreement if rehabilitation is non-substantial and to the 10-year use agreement if

Sub-Recipient	For the purposes of the HOPWA program, a sub-recipient is an organization that receives funds under a contract with the project sponsor to carry out eligible HOPWA activities. For the purposes of HOPWA annual performance reporting, a sub-recipient organization does not need to submit a separate "Provider Workbook." The sub-recipient's HOPWA activities should be included in the "Provider Workbook" of the project sponsor with whom they have a contract.
Supportive Services	Costs include providing housing stability services, assistance in gaining access to mainstream resources, public benefits, healthcare and support positive health outcomes. However, health services may only be provided to individuals with acquired immunodeficiency syndrome or related diseases and not to family members of these individuals. HOPWA does not place restrictions on the length of time eligible persons may receive TBRA. Grantees should provide the opportunity for eligible households to transition in place to self-sufficiency or another subsidy. Eligible TBRA costs include rental payments, staff time to verify household income for TBRA assistance, calculation of resident rent payment, monthly rental payments, processing a TBRA rental payment on behalf of the HOPWA-eligible individual, annual housing inspections to ensure HOPWA habitability standards are met for units being assisted with TBRA, reasonable travel costs to units for housing inspections, review of a client's selected unit for rent reasonableness and rent standard, annual recertification for households receiving ongoing TBRA, and staff time for resolving landlord issues directly related to providing the TBRA assistance.
VAWA Internal Emergency Transfers	Per 24 CFR 5.2005e, an internal emergency transfer under the Violence Against Women Act (VAWA) protections refers to an emergency relocation of a tenant to another unit where the tenant would not be categorized as a new applicant; that is, the tenant may reside in the new unit without having to undergo an application process.
VAWA External Emergency Transfers	Per 24 CFR 5.2005e, an external emergency transfer under the VAWA protections refers to an emergency relocation of a tenant to another unit where the tenant would be categorized as a new applicant; that is, the tenant must undergo an application process in order to reside in the new unit.

All households (100%) received case management from an assigned case manager, were provided with a housing and budget plan, and either accessed or maintained a source of medical assistance. Since 2016, the program has been offering essential HOPWA services to the El Paso community. In addition to the 89 households, 27 additional beneficiaries/members also benefited from the program, bringing the total number of individuals served to 116. Supportive Services and Case Management remain central to the program's success, offering nutritional support, outreach, and referrals to social services such as mental health care, educational resources, food banks, meal and nutrition programs, and transportation assistance through bus passes. Through comprehensive case management, DPH helps clients achieve housing stability while enhancing access to healthcare. Referrals are coordinated with Ryan White service providers for medical care, as well as mental health counseling, substance use treatment, job training, nutritional services, and education on biomedical interventions including Treatment as Prevention (TasP) and Undetectable = Untransmissible (U=U). To ensure a strong network of support, DPH partners with community organizations and local institutions through memoranda of understanding and interlocal agreements. These collaborations strengthen service delivery and expand resources available to HOPWA clients across El Paso County. HOPWA PROVIDER TAB DATA COMMENTS:

By the end of YR50, a total of 89 clients were enrolled in the HOPWA Program, with 78 of these individuals identifying as Hispanic. In addition, 27 household members or beneficiaries were served, bringing the total number of people impacted to 116. This total reflects not only the direct clients but also their household members, underscoring the program's far-reaching impact on families and communities.

Among the newly enrolled clients, three reported previously renting a room or apartment, five had been staying temporarily in someone else's home, and one individual was experiencing homelessness by residing in a shelter; however, this case did not meet the definition of chronic homelessness. These housing situations highlight the precarious conditions many clients face prior to program entry and illustrate the critical role HOPWA plays in stabilizing housing for vulnerable populations.

Of the 27 household beneficiaries, eight were minors. Their inclusion emphasizes the importance of HOPWA in providing stability not only for individuals living with HIV/AIDS but also for their families, particularly children. By addressing housing needs, the program helps ensure that minors have a safer, more secure environment in which to thrive, while supporting their caregivers in accessing medical care and supportive services.
These outcomes reinforce HOPWA's essential role in reducing housing instability, promoting health equity, and fostering long-term stability for individuals and families affected by HIV/AIDS across the EI Paso community.
LEVERAGING AND PROGRAM INCOME TAB DATA COMMENTS:
TENANT-BASED RENTAL ASSISTANCE TAB (TBRA) DATA COMMENTS:
By the end of YR50, a total of 89 clients were enrolled in the HOPWA Program, with program expenditures totaling \$652,617. Of these 89 households, 85 reported incomes below 30% of the Area Median Income (AMI), while four reported incomes between 31%–50% of AMI. In total, 116 individuals, including clients and household beneficiaries, were supported in accessing or maintaining a source of income. Despite this, 33 of the 89 clients reported having no income at all. Even with these income challenges, all 89 clients were able to access or maintain medical insurance, ensuring critical healthcare coverage. Every client was also prescribed Anti-Retroviral Therapy (ART), resulting in improved viral load outcomes or viral suppression. Program retention data further reflect the program's stability and impact: 38 clients have been served for 1–5 years, while 39 households have remained enrolled for over 5 years but less than 10. Looking ahead, 56 enrolled households will continue receiving HOPWA Tenant-Based Rental Assistance (TBRA) into the next year, while 33 households exited the program during this reporting period. Of those who exited, 16 transitioned to another HOPWA housing program, two entered another housing subsidy program, four moved into private housing, two entered jail or prison, four became disconnected, and five clients passed away. These outcomes underscore the program's commitment to long-term housing support, access to healthcare, and stability for individuals and families impacted by HIV/AIDS in the El Paso community.

The actual value of the support can be the contribution of professional services, based on customary rates for this specialized support, or actual costs contributed from other leveraged resources. In determining a rate for the contribution of volunteer time and services, use the criteria described in 2 CFR part 200. The value of any donated material, equipment, building, or lease should be based on the fair market value at time of donation. Related documentation can be from recent bills of sale, advertised prices, appraisals, or other information for comparable property similarly situated.

Leasing Costs	Costs used to lease all or a portion of a building as needed to provide housing to eligible households. For eligible individuals or families unable to hold leases in their names, funding may be used to "master lease" units, where the eligible households choose the units, the grantee or project sponsor leases the units and pays the full rent to the landlord, and the eligible households pay the grantee or project sponsor the amount required by 24 CFR 574.310(d). This type of master leasing can be administered as "turn-key" housing assistance, to be replaced with Tenant-Based Rental Assistance (TBRA) if the landlord agrees to transfer the lease to the eligible person. Funding may also be used to master lease units to be operated as transitional housing for eligible households. For example, post-incarceration programs often lease a unit to temporarily house an eligible household returning to the community until other more permanent housing arrangements can be made. The lease is always in the organization's name. The furniture, housing equipment, and supplies, eligible under the operating budget line item, belong to the organization and remain in the unit for the next household's use. Eligible leasing costs include the cost to lease a housing facility or scattered-site units, staff time to negotiate lease terms with lessor or landlord, and annual housing inspections to ensure HOPWA habitability standards are met for scattered-site units assisted with Leasing.
Leveraged Funds	The amount of funds expended during the operating year from non-HOPWA federal, state, local, and private sources. Leveraged funds are used to further support
	HOPWA clients receiving assistance during the operating year for formula grants, or under the applicable competitive grant. A person who resides with the HOPWA-Eligible Individual and who meets the following criteria: (1) is essential to the care and well-being of the person; (2) is not
Live-In Aide	obligated for the support of the person; and (3) would not be living in the unit except to provide the necessary supportive services. See 24 CFR 5.403 and the HOPWA Grantee Oversight Resource Guide for additional reference.
Master Leasing	Applies to the leasing of units of housing (scattered-sites or entire buildings) from a landlord by a nonprofit or public agency that subleases the units to HOPWA- eligible tenants. By assuming the tenancy burden, the agency facilitates housing of clients who may not be able to maintain a lease on their own due to poor credit, evictions, or lack of sufficient income.
Minimum Use Periods	Grantees that used HOPWA funding for new construction, acquisition, conversion, lease, or substantial rehabilitation of a building or structure are required to operate the building or structure for HOPWA-eligible individuals for a 10-year period. In the case of non-substantial rehabilitation or repair of a building or structure, the minimum use period is not less than 3 years. If no further HOPWA funds are used to support the facility, in place of completing the "CAP DEV" tab in the Performance Report Worksheet, the grantee must complete an "Annual Report of Continued Project Operation" throughout the required use periods. This report is found on the "STEWARD" tab of the Grantee Workbook.
Medically Assisted Living Facilities	HOPWA facility-based housing that assists residents with most or all activities of daily living, such as meals, bathing, dressing, and toileting. Regular medical care, supervision, and rehabilitation are also often available.
Operating Costs	Costs of operating a housing facility owned or leased by the grantee or project sponsor, to the extent the costs are necessary to house eligible households. Eligible operating costs include utilities, property insurance, minor repairs, and upkeep of the facility, maintenance both inside and outside the facility, procurement and contracting of services for facility operation or maintenance, furniture and appliances that will remain with the facility, food purchases and kitchen operation for HOPWA household at the facility, and staff time for directing any of the eligible operating costs mentioned above at the facility for eligible households (24 CFR §574.300(b)(8)).
Operating Year – Competitive grantees	HOPWA competitive grants are awarded for a 3-year period of performance with annual performance reports submitted for each of the 3 operating years. The information contained in this performance report should reflect the grantee's operating year with the beginning date determined at the time the grant agreement is signed. Project sponsor accomplishment information must coincide with the operating year this Performance Report covers. Any change to the period of performance requires the approval of HUD by amendment, such as an extension for one additional operating year. A PSH renewal/replacement grant start date would be coordinated with the close out of the existing grant. Grantees with an approved extension period of less than 6 months must submit the Performance Report for the third year of the grant term at the end of the approved extension period and incorporate data from the additional months. Grantees with an approved extension period of 6 months or more must turn in a Performance Report at the end of the extension period.
Operating Year — Formula grantees	HOPWA Formula Grantees follow the Grantee Program Year as established by the Consolidated Planning Processes. All CPD Programs (HOME/ESG/CDBG/HOPWA) use the same 12-month period as their Operating Year for performance reporting. The information contained in each annual performance report must represent a one-year time period of HOPWA program operation that coincides with the grantee's program year. HOPWA Formula Grantees are annually awarded grants with a 3-year period of performance, as established by the Grantee signature date on the Grant Agreement. Since Grant period of performances vary from Fiscal Year, and do not necessarily coincide with a Grantee's Operating Year, funds from more than one HOPWA formula grant awarded to the same grantee may be used during an operating year and the annual performance report must capture all formula grant funding used during the operating year. Project sponsor accomplishment information must also align with the operating year the annual performance report covers.
Outcome	The degree to which the HOPWA assisted household has been enabled to establish or maintain a stable living environment in housing that is safe, decent, and sanitary (per the regulations at 24 CFR 574.310(b)) and to reduce the risks of homelessness and improve access to HIV treatment and other health care and support.
Output	The number of units of housing or households that receive HOPWA assistance during the operating year.
Permanent Housing Placement (PHP)	Eligible costs under PHP include security deposits not to exceed two months of rent, rental application fees, credit checks, one-time utility hook-up fees paid directly to the utility company, utility arrears only if the cost is creating a barrier to establishing permanent housing in a new unit, rent arrears only if past due rent debt at a prior unit is a barrier to accessing a new unit, initial housing inspections, reasonable travel costs to units for initial housing inspections, staff time to review and identify causes for eviction and responsibilities of the tenant within the least, staff time for assisting clients with executing the lease, and staff time for resolving landlord issues directly related to the PHP assistance being provided. PHP can be used in conjunction with TBRA where PHP pays the security deposit and TBRA covers ongoing monthly rent payments starting with the first month. PHP must only be used to assist the client in entering permanent housing. PHP must never be used for monthly rent or on-going utility costs where a client is already in permanent housing. Although PHP is included as a supportive service under 24 CFR 574.300(b)(7), HUD has established a dedicated BLI for PHP to distinguish it from other supportive services.
Program Income	As defined in 2 CFR 200.1, program income is income earned by the grantee or project sponsor that is directly generated by a supported activity or earned as a result of the grant during the period of performance (except as provided by 2 CFR 200.307). See grant administration requirements on program income at 2 CFR 200.307 and the Federal award.
Project-Based Rental Assistance (PBRA)	A rental subsidy program that is tied to specific facilities or units owned or controlled by a project sponsor. Assistance is tied directly to the properties and is not portable or transferable.
Project Sponsor Organizations	Per HOPWA regulations at 24 CFR 574.3, any nonprofit organization or governmental housing agency that receives funds under a contract with the grantee to provide eligible housing and other support services or administrative services as defined in 24 CFR 574.300. Project Sponsor organizations are required to provide performance data on households served and funds expended.
Resource Identification	Resource identification funds may be used to establish, coordinate, and develop permanent housing assistance resources for eligible persons (including conducting preliminary research and making expenditures necessary to determine the feasibility of specific housing-related initiatives) (24 CFR § 574.300(b)(2)). Activities can include increasing coordination with local initiatives, systems, or strategies (such as the local Continuum of Care or Ryan White Planning Council) to house HOPWA-eligible individuals, development of new housing resources, and conducting community needs assessments to inform system design.
Rural	For purposes of HOPWA reporting, a rural county is a county in which: (1) Has no part of it within an area designated as a standard metropolitan statistical area by the Office of Management and Budget; or (2) is within an area designated as a metropolitan statistical area or considered as part of a metropolitan statistical area and at least 75% of its population is local on U.S. Census blocks classified as non-urban, or (3) is located in a state that has a population density of less than 30 persons per square mile (as reported in the most recent decennial census), and of which at least 1.25% of the total acreage of such State is under Federal jurisdiction.
Short-Term Rent, Mortgage, and Utility (STRMU) Assistance	Short-term rent, mortgage, and utility payments to prevent the homelessness of the tenant or mortgagor of a dwelling (24 CFR 574.300(b)(6)). Eligible STRMU costs include up to 21 weeks of the HOPWA-eligible individual's rent, mortgage, and/or utility costs, and the costs of staff time to review and determine household's need for STRMU assistance and make the STRMU payments. For the purposes of STRMU assistance, to the extent that taxes, insurance, condominium fees, or other building operation costs are included in the monthly mortgage payment either by federal regulation or the terms of the mortgage, these expenses are eligible to be included in the STRMU mortgage assistance payments. STRMU mortgage assistance for taxes, insurance, or condo fees that are not included on the monthly mortgage statement are not eligible.
Stewardship Units	Units developed with HOPWA, where HOPWA funds were used for acquisition, new construction, and/or rehabilitation that no longer receive operating subsidies from HOPWA. Report information for the units is subject to the 3-year use agreement if rehabilitation is non-substantial and to the 10-year use agreement if

Sub-Recipient	For the purposes of the HOPWA program, a sub-recipient is an organization that receives funds under a contract with the project sponsor to carry out eligible HOPWA activities. For the purposes of HOPWA annual performance reporting, a sub-recipient organization does not need to submit a separate "Provider Workbook." The sub-recipient's HOPWA activities should be included in the "Provider Workbook" of the project sponsor with whom they have a contract.
Supportive Services	Costs include providing housing stability services, assistance in gaining access to mainstream resources, public benefits, healthcare and support positive health outcomes. However, health services may only be provided to individuals with acquired immunodeficiency syndrome or related diseases and not to family members of these individuals. Eligible supportive services costs include staff time to develop, update and review individualized housing and service plans for clients; staff time to connect households to appropriate services and treatment in accordance with their housing and service plans, management-level consultation (case staffing); health and mental health assessment services; direct outpatient treatment by licensed professionals of mental health services; substance use disorder services provided by licensed or certified professionals; individual, family, or group therapy to address co-occurring disorders; nutritional services including food banks, nutritional supplements, and counseling by certified nutrition specialists; life skills trainings such as budgeting resources, resolving conflict, using public transportation, unit maintenance; credit counseling; education services including instruction or training in consumer education, health education, substance use prevention, literacy, English as a Second Language, and General Educational Development (GED); job training or job coaching including resume development; client transportation to and from medical care, employment, child care, or other eligible essential services facilities; and HOPWA provider transportation to meet with clients for supportive service needs (24 CFR §574.300(b)(7)).
Tenant-Based Rental Assistance (TBRA)	TBRA is a rental subsidy program that grantees can provide to help low-income households access affordable housing. HOPWA does not place restrictions on the length of time eligible persons may receive TBRA. Grantees should provide the opportunity for eligible households to transition in place to self-sufficiency or another subsidy. Eligible TBRA costs include rental payments, staff time to verify household income for TBRA assistance, calculation of resident rent payment, monthly rental payments, processing a TBRA rental payment on behalf of the HOPWA-eligible individual, annual housing inspections to ensure HOPWA habitability standards are met for units being assisted with TBRA, reasonable travel costs to units for housing inspections, review of a client's selected unit for rent reasonableness and rent standard, annual recertification for households receiving ongoing TBRA, and staff time for resolving landlord issues directly related to providing the TBRA assistance.
VAWA Internal Emergency Transfers	Per 24 CFR 5.2005e, an internal emergency transfer under the Violence Against Women Act (VAWA) protections refers to an emergency relocation of a tenant to another unit where the tenant would not be categorized as a new applicant; that is, the tenant may reside in the new unit without having to undergo an application process.
VAWA External Emergency Transfers	Per 24 CFR 5.2005e, an external emergency transfer under the VAWA protections refers to an emergency relocation of a tenant to another unit where the tenant would be categorized as a new applicant; that is, the tenant must undergo an application process in order to reside in the new unit.
Veteran	A veteran is someone who has served on active duty in the Armed Forces of the United States. This does not include inactive military reserves or the National Guard unless the person was called up to active duty.

For example, if a household received both HOPWA TBRA and HOPWA PHP from the same project sponsor, adjusting for duplication would ensure that household was only counted once when calculating the HOPWA housing subsidy assistance household total.
Administrative Agent	An entity the grantee has selected to carry out administrative activities on behalf of the grantee. When a grantee utilizes another organization to carry out some or all of the grantee's administrative functions, the administrative activities, costs, and terms of payment should be clearly delineated in a contract or other written agreement between the parties. All costs associated with administering the grant, whether incurred by the grantee or the other organization, are subject to the 3% administrative cost limit. ((1) A homeless individual with a disability as defined in section 401(9) of the McKinney-Vento Assistance Act (42 U.S.C. 11360(9)) who: a) lives in a place not meant for human habitation, a safe haven, or in an emergency shelter, and b) has been homeless and living as described for at least 12 months or on at least 4 separate occasions in the last 3 years, as long as the combined occasions equal at least 12 months and each break in homelessness separating the occasions included at least 7 consecutive night of not living as described; (2) An individual who has been residing in an institutional care facility, including jail, substance abuse or mental health treatment facility, hospital, or other similar facility, for fewer than 90 days and met all of the criteria of this definition before entering that facility; or (3) A family with an adult head of household (or, if there is no adult in the family, a minor head of household) who meets all of the criteria of this definition, including a family whose composition has fluctuated while the head of household has been homeless).)
Contractor	A contractor is an entity that receives a legal instrument (contract) by which a grantee or project sponsor purchases property or services needed to carry out the project or program under a Federal award. The purpose of the contract is to obtain goods and services for the grantee/project sponsor's own use and creates a procurement relationship with the contractor. Faith-Based Organization	Religious organizations of three types: (1) congregations; (2) national networks, which include national denominations, their social service arms (for example, Catholic Charities, Lutheran Social Services), and networks of related organizations (such as YMCA and YWCA); and (3) freestanding religious organizations, which are incorporated separately from congregations and national networks.
Grassroots Organization	An organization that is headquartered in the local community where it provides services, has a social services budget of \$300,000 or less annually, and has six or fewer full-time equivalent employees. Local affiliates of national organizations are not considered "grassroots."
HOPWA-Eligible Individual	The one low-income person with HIV/AIDS who qualifies a household for HOPWA assistance. This person may be considered "Head of Household." Where there is more than one person with HIV/AIDS in the household, the additional PWH/A(s), would be considered a beneficiary(s).
Housing Information Services	Costs to provide counseling, information, or referral services to assist an eligible person to locate, acquire, finance, and maintain housing (24 CFR § 574.300(b)(1)). Some eligible costs under Housing Information Services include staff time to assist eligible clients in searching for or locating appropriate housing whether HOPWA-subsidized or not; staff time to provide fair housing guidance for eligible households who may encounter discrimination on the basis of race, color, religion, sex,, age, national origin, familial status, or disability; staff time to provide housing counseling to acquire and finance housing; and development and use of Homeless Management Information System (HMIS) elements to coordinate housing assistance for eligible households. HMIS costs billed to housing information services must be pro-rated and not include HMIS reporting. Use of HMIS for reporting purposes is considered an administrative activity and must be billed to administrative costs.
HOPWA Housing Subsidy Assistance Total	The unduplicated number of households receiving housing subsidies (TBRA, STRMU, Permanent Housing Placement services and Master Leasing) and/or residing in units of facilities dedicated to persons living with HIV/AIDS and their families and supported with HOPWA funds during the program year for formula grantees and the operating year for competitive grantees.
Household	A single individual or a family, as defined in 24 CFR 574.3. The term is used for collecting data on changes in income, changes in access to services, receipt of housing information services, and outcomes on achieving housing stability. Live-In Aides (see definition for Live-In Aide) and non-household members (e.g., a shared housing arrangement with a roommate) who resided in the unit are not reported in the annual performance report.
Improved HIV Viral Load	A reduction in the load or volume of HIV present in the HOPWA-eligible individual's blood at the end of the operating year compared to the beginning of the operating year. Most people with HIV/AIDS (PWH) who are engaged in medical care have routine laboratory tests. The HOPWA-eligible individual's two most recent laboratory reports can be used to determine viral load improvement, even if the first laboratory test was performed in a prior operating year.
In-kind Leveraged Resources	These are additional types of support provided to assist HOPWA-eligible individuals such as volunteer services, materials, use of equipment, and building space. The actual value of the support can be the contribution of professional services, based on customary rates for this specialized support, or actual costs contributed from other leveraged resources. In determining a rate for the contribution of volunteer time and services, use the criteria described in 2 CFR part 200. The value of any donated material, equipment, building, or lease should be based on the fair market value at time of donation. Related documentation can be from recent bills of sale, advertised prices, appraisals, or other information for comparable property similarly situated.

Leasing Costs	Costs used to lease all or a portion of a building as needed to provide housing to eligible households. For eligible individuals or families unable to hold leases in their names, funding may be used to "master lease" units, where the eligible households choose the units, the grantee or project sponsor leases the units and pays the full rent to the landlord, and the eligible households pay the grantee or project sponsor the amount required by 24 CFR 574.310(d). This type of master leasing can be administered as "turn-key" housing assistance, to be replaced with Tenant-Based Rental Assistance (TBRA) if the landlord agrees to transfer the lease to the eligible person. Funding may also be used to master lease units to be operated as transitional housing for eligible households. For example, post-incarceration programs often lease a unit to temporarily house an eligible household returning to the community until other more permanent housing arrangements can be made. The lease is always in the organization's name. The furniture, housing equipment, and supplies, eligible under the operating budget line item, belong to the organization and remain in the unit for the next household's use. Eligible leasing costs include the cost to lease a housing facility or scattered-site units, staff time to negotiate lease terms with lessor or landlord, and annual housing inspections to ensure HOPWA habitability standards are met for scattered-site units assisted with Leasing.
Leveraged Funds	The amount of funds expended during the operating year from non-HOPWA federal, state, local, and private sources. Leveraged funds are used to further support HOPWA clients receiving assistance during the operating year for formula grants, or under the applicable competitive grant.
Live-In Aide	A person who resides with the HOPWA-Eligible Individual and who meets the following criteria: (1) is essential to the care and well-being of the person; (2) is not obligated for the support of the person; and (3) would not be living in the unit except to provide the necessary supportive services. See 24 CFR 5.403 and the HOPWA Grantee Oversight Resource Guide for additional reference.
Master Leasing	Applies to the leasing of units of housing (scattered-sites or entire buildings) from a landlord by a nonprofit or public agency that subleases the units to HOPWA-eligible tenants. By assuming the tenancy burden, the agency facilitates housing of clients who may not be able to maintain a lease on their own due to poor credit, evictions, or lack of sufficient income.
Minimum Use Periods	Grantees that used HOPWA funding for new construction, acquisition, conversion, lease, or substantial rehabilitation of a building or structure are required to operate the building or structure for HOPWA-eligible individuals for a 10-year period. In the case of non-substantial rehabilitation or repair of a building or structure, the minimum use period is not less than 3 years. If no further HOPWA funds are used to support the facility, in place of completing the "CAP DEV" tab in the Performance Report Worksheet, the grantee must complete an "Annual Report of Continued Project Operation" throughout the required use periods. This report is found on the "STEWARD" tab of the Grantee Workbook.
Medically Assisted Living Facilities	HOPWA facility-based housing that assists residents with most or all activities of daily living, such as meals, bathing, dressing, and toileting. Regular medical care, supervision, and rehabilitation are also often available.
Operating Costs	Costs of operating a housing facility owned or leased by the grantee or project sponsor, to the extent the costs are necessary to house eligible households. Eligible operating costs include utilities, property insurance, minor repairs, and upkeep of the facility, maintenance both inside and outside the facility, procurement and contracting of services for facility operation or maintenance, furniture and appliances that will remain with the facility, food purchases and kitchen operation for HOPWA household at the facility, and staff time for directing any of the eligible operating costs mentioned above at the facility for eligible households (24 CFR §574.300(b)(8)).
Operating Year – Competitive grantees	HOPWA competitive grants are awarded for a 3-year period of performance with annual performance reports submitted for each of the 3 operating years. The information contained in this performance report should reflect the grantee's operating year with the beginning date determined at the time the grant agreement is signed. Project sponsor accomplishment information must coincide with the operating year this Performance Report covers. Any change to the period of performance requires the approval of HUD by amendment, such as an extension for one additional operating year. A PSH renewal/replacement grant start date would be coordinated with the close out of the existing grant. Grantees with an approved extension period of less than 6 months must submit the Performance Report for the third year of the grant term at the end of the approved extension period and incorporate data from the additional months. Output	The number of units of housing or households that receive HOPWA assistance during the operating year.
Permanent Housing Placement (PHP)	Eligible costs under PHP include security deposits not to exceed two months of rent, rental application fees, credit checks, one-time utility hook-up fees paid directly to the utility company, utility arrears only if the cost is creating a barrier to establishing permanent housing in a new unit, rent arrears only if past due rent debt at a prior unit is a barrier to accessing a new unit, initial housing inspections, reasonable travel costs to units for initial housing inspections, staff time to review and identify causes for eviction and responsibilities of the tenant within the least, staff time for assisting clients with executing the lease, and staff time for resolving landlord issues directly related to the PHP assistance being provided. PHP can be used in conjunction with TBRA where PHP pays the security deposit and TBRA covers ongoing monthly rent payments starting with the first month. PHP must only be used to assist the client in entering permanent housing. PHP must never be used for monthly rent or on-going utility costs where a client is already in permanent housing. Although PHP is included as a supportive service under 24 CFR 574.300(b)(7), HUD has established a dedicated BLI for PHP to distinguish it from other supportive services.
Program Income	As defined in 2 CFR 200.1, program income is income earned by the grantee or project sponsor that is directly generated by a supported activity or earned as a result of the grant during the period of performance (except as provided by 2 CFR 200.307). See grant administration requirements on program income at 2 CFR 200.307 and the Federal award.
Project-Based Rental Assistance (PBRA)	A rental subsidy program that is tied to specific facilities or units owned or controlled by a project sponsor. Assistance is tied directly to the properties and is not portable or transferable.
Project Sponsor Organizations	Per HOPWA regulations at 24 CFR 574.3, any nonprofit organization or governmental housing agency that receives funds under a contract with the grantee to provide eligible housing and other support services or administrative services as defined in 24 CFR 574.300. Project Sponsor organizations are required to provide performance data on households served and funds expended.
Resource Identification	Resource identification funds may be used to establish, coordinate, and develop permanent housing assistance resources for eligible persons (including conducting preliminary research and making expenditures necessary to determine the feasibility of specific housing-related initiatives) (24 CFR § 574.300(b)(2)). Activities can include increasing coordination with local initiatives, systems, or strategies (such as the local Continuum of Care or Ryan White Planning Council) to house HOPWA-eligible individuals, development of new housing resources, and conducting community needs assessments to inform system design.
Rural	For purposes of HOPWA reporting, a rural county is a county in which: (1) Has no part of it within an area designated as a standard metropolitan statistical area by the Office of Management and Budget; or (2) Is within an area designated as a metropolitan statistical area or considered as part of a metropolitan statistical area and at least 75% of its population is local on U.S. Census blocks classified as non-urban; or (3) is located in a state that has a population density of less than 30 persons per square mile (as reported in the most recent decennial census), and of which at least 1.25% of the total acreage of such State is under Federal jurisdiction.
Short-Term Rent, Mortgage, and Utility (STRMU) Assistance	Short-term rent, mortgage, and utility payments to prevent the homelessness of the tenant or mortgagor of a dwelling (24 CFR 574.300(b)(6)). Eligible STRMU costs include up to 21 weeks of the HOPWA-eligible individual's rent, mortgage, and/or utility costs, and the costs of staff time to review and determine household's need for STRMU assistance and make the STRMU payments. For the purposes of STRMU assistance, to the extent that taxes, insurance, condominium fees, or other building operation costs are included in the monthly mortgage payment either by federal regulation or the terms of the mortgage, these expenses are eligible to be included in the STRMU mortgage assistance payments. STRMU mortgage assistance for taxes, insurance, or condo fees that are not included on the monthly mortgage statement are not eligible.
Stewardship Units	Units developed with HOPWA, where HOPWA funds were used for acquisition, new construction, and/or rehabilitation that no longer receive operating subsidies from HOPWA. Report information for the units is subject to the 3-year use agreement if rehabilitation is non-substantial and to the 10-year use agreement if rehabilitation

Sub-Recipient	For the purposes of the HOPWA program, a sub-recipient is an organization that receives funds under a contract with the project sponsor to carry out eligible HOPWA activities. For the purposes of HOPWA annual performance reporting, a sub-recipient organization does not need to submit a separate "Provider Workbook." The sub-recipient's HOPWA activities should be included in the "Provider Workbook" of the project sponsor with whom they have a contract.
Supportive Services	Costs include providing housing stability services, assistance in gaining access to mainstream resources, public benefits, healthcare and support positive health outcomes. However, health services may only be provided to individuals with acquired immunodeficiency syndrome or related diseases and not to family members of these individuals. Eligible supportive services costs include staff time to develop, update and review individualized housing and service plans for clients; staff time to connect households to appropriate services and treatment in accordance with their housing and service plans, management-level consultation (case staffing); health and mental health assessment services; direct outpatient treatment by licensed professionals of mental health services; substance use disorder services provided by licensed or certified professionals; individual, family, or group therapy to address co-occurring disorders; nutritional services including food banks, nutritional supplements, and counseling by certified nutrition specialists; life skills trainings such as budgeting resources, resolving conflict, using public transportation, unit maintenance; credit counseling; education services including instruction or training in consumer education, health education, substance use prevention, literacy, English as a Second Language, and General Educational Development (GED); job training or job coaching including resume development; client transportation to and from medical care, employment, child care, or other eligible essential services facilities; and HOPWA provider transportation to meet with clients for supportive service needs (24 CFR §574.300(b)(7)).
Tenant-Based Rental Assistance (TBRA)	TBRA is a rental subsidy program that grantees can provide to help low-income households access affordable housing. HOPWA does not place restrictions on the length of time eligible persons may receive TBRA. Grantees should provide the opportunity for eligible households to transition in place to self-sufficiency or another subsidy. Eligible TBRA costs include rental payments, staff time to verify household income for RBRA assistance, calculation of resident rent payment, monthly rental payments, processing a TBRA rental payment on behalf of the HOPWA-eligible individual, annual housing inspections to ensure HOPWA habitability standards are met for units being assisted with TBRA, reasonable travel costs to units for housing inspections, review of a client's selected unit for rent reasonableness and rent standard, annual recertification for households receiving ongoing TBRA, and staff time for resolving landlord issues directly related to providing the TBRA assistance.
VAWA Internal Emergency Transfers	Per 24 CFR 5.2005e, an internal emergency transfer under the Violence Against Women Act (VAWA) protections refers to an emergency relocation of a tenant to another unit where the tenant would not be categorized as a new applicant; that is, the tenant may reside in the new unit without having to undergo an application process.
VAWA External Emergency Transfers	Per 24 CFR 5.2005e, an external emergency transfer under the VAWA protections refers to an emergency relocation of a tenant to another unit where the tenant would be categorized as a new applicant; that is, the tenant must undergo an application process in order to reside in the new unit.
Veteran	A veteran is someone who has served on active duty in the Armed Forces of the United States. This does not include inactive military reserves or the National Guard unless the person was called up to active duty.
