

Understanding the importance of organizing and working together to improve the neighborhoods, she led the efforts of galvanizing more than 100 members from different neighborhoods in the Mission Valley area to create the Corridor20 Civic Association.

She has been recognized as the "Community Leader of the Year" by the City of El Paso and is currently serving her second term as Chair of the El Paso Neighborhood Coalition. She firmly believes that the only way to achieve community goals is by doing it TOGETHER. #todossomosneighbors.



## **Nicole Ferrini**

Holding degrees in both interior design and architecture from Texas Tech University, Nicole has leveraged her background in design and systems thinking to launch a career building better, stronger, more prosperous communities. In 2014, Nicole became the first Latina in the world to serve as Chief Resilience Officer (CRO) for a municipal government.

Most recently Nicole is serving as Director of Community + Human Development for the City of El Paso, in which she continues to raise the bar for city leadership by provoking innovation among civic leaders, industry professionals and the community at large. She remains focused on building grass roots resilience across the Paso Del Norte region, emphasizing dynamic solutions to the challenges of climate instability, urban development, housing, homelessness, economic prosperity and social justice.

Jennifer Prophete is the Director of The Hopeful Neighborhood Project. The Hopeful Neighborhood Project is dedicated to helping everyday neighbors pursue the common good, right where they live. Jennifer has spent 20 years working in the fields of urban education, community development, and non-profit leadership. As a native of rural Nebraska, she grew up with a strong sense of the power of community. Her desire to live in community, no matter the neighborhood context, has been a driving force in her life and work.

Jennifer has a bachelor's degree from Concordia University-Nebraska in elementary education with certificates in English-as-an-Other-Language, special education, and early childhood education. She received an MBA from the University of Saint Mary. Jennifer and her husband live in Saint Charles, MO with their three young children and among their amazing neighbors.



## Rosa Guerrero

### Keynote - Neighborhood of the Year Luncheon

Rosa Ramirez Guerrero of El Paso, Texas, is an artist, educator, dance historian, and humanitarian. Mrs. Guerrero founded and became the artistic director of the International Folklorico Dance Group. Her film "Tapestry," based upon creating cultural harmony and understanding, was honored with a national award for documentary filmmaking. She was awarded a lifetime membership with the Texas PTA and was the first Hispanic woman in El Paso to have a school, Rosa Guerrero Elementary, named in her honor.

Rosa Guerrero has been called "a tapestry of many cultures whose mission is to share this tapestry of cultural diversity, and how it is woven, with all people." She continues her mission of love, peace, and cultural understanding to this day as an educational consultant giving presentations and lectures.

## **Dr. Richard Pineda**

**Moderator - Neighborhood of the Year Luncheon**

Dr. Richard Pineda is Chair of the Department of Communication and Director of the Sam Donaldson Center for Communication Studies at The University of Texas at El Paso (UTEP). Originally from El Paso, Dr. Pineda has been back home nearly 20 years as a faculty member at UTEP.

In that time, Dr. Pineda has focused his research on the intersection of political communication, Latinidad, and popular culture. He has served as a Hunt Family Foundation Fellow with the Aspen Institute and is sought after as a media commentator on political and cultural issues for regional and national media.



## **Ben Miranda**

**Panelist - Neighborhood of the Year Luncheon**

As the Deputy Senior Director of Operational Business Development for the national non-profit Endeavors, Benjamin Miranda Jr. is responsible for the operation and expansion of programs supporting Veterans, migrants, people struggling with homelessness, and communities in crisis. Ben is also the owner of Cross-Cultural Leadership Development, a leadership training company, and co-owner and Chief Operating Officer of Doctor Bins, an eco-friendly residential and commercial cleaning service.

A 24-year Veteran of the United States Air Force, Ben rose to the Air Force's highest rank of Chief Master Sergeant. He deployed in support of Operations ENDURING FREEDOM, IRAQI FREEDOM, NEW DAWN, and UNIFIED RESPONSE, as well as to multiple counter-drug operations in Latin America. He has served on the board for many Veteran and community programs, including as a Commissioner for the Texas Military Preparedness Commission, as well as the George W. Bush Institute's Stand-To Veteran Leadership Program.

## Eric Pearson

**Panelist - Neighborhood of the Year Luncheon**

Eric Pearson is the president and CEO of the El Paso Community Foundation. He is a native El Pasoan who came up through public schools and the University of Texas at El Paso, and worked for about 20 years in broadcast journalism and media prior to joining the El Paso Community Foundation in 2003. Eric has been CEO since 2011; he has worked to engage the El Paso Community Foundation in solid leadership projects.

Grants, community convening, and leadership projects define the El Paso Community Foundation. The Foundation has grown since 1977 to approximately \$210 million in assets, and in the process has given more than \$249 million in charitable gifts and projects to West Texas, Southern New Mexico and northern Mexico.



## Andrea Ramirez

**Panelist - Neighborhood of the Year Luncheon**

Mrs. Andrea Ramirez began her 13-year journey with Amistad, a not-for-profit agency serving elderly, persons with disabilities and persons-at-risk. as the Director of the Aging, Disability & Transportation Resource Center (ADTRC) and was later promoted to COO of Social Service Programs. Her success at the agency has revolved around grant writing and sustainability to provide much needed services to the El Paso community.

As of June 1, 2020, she assumed her the role as CEO for Amistad. She is a Licensed Professional Counselor (LPC), a Licensed Professional Dependency Counselor (LPDC), a Society of Human Resource Management Certified Professional (SHRM-CP) and holds a Master of Counseling with a Specialization in Marriage, Family and Child Therapy. She was a member of Leadership Class 41 with the El Paso Chamber of Commerce and was selected as a Woman of Impact by the El Paso Inc. in 2021.



## T1: Southside Neighborhoods Mural Tour

**Bus Tour/ Moderate Walking/ Limited wheelchair accessibility.**

The Murals in the Segundo Barrio Neighborhood in the El Paso Southside area are a latent reminder of who we are as a Border Community. Segundo Barrio is Spanish for "The Second Neighborhood". The site is iconic for its history and closeness to the port of entry to Ciudad Juarez in Mexico. The Murals located throughout the Segundo Barrio Neighborhood and beyond honor our neighborhood's values and strengthen the border culture in El Paso.

## T2: Breathtaking views of the Paso del Norte Region

**Bus Tour/ Moderate Walking/ Limited wheelchair accessibility.**

The drive will make its first stop at the iconic El Paso High School. The school, built in 1916, is the oldest operating high school in El Paso, Texas. The Portico of Octavia in Rome inspires the campus's unique Greco-Roman Architecture. The next visit will be to two of the most impressive Central neighborhoods, the Rim area neighborhood, and the Kern Place neighborhood, with a vibrant community nestled in the foothills of the Franklin Mountains. The Neighborhoods are just uphill from Downtown, so urban life is enjoyed too. El Paso is a special place because of the breathtaking views from the Scenic Drive area. The site has a fantastic view of downtown El Paso and Ciudad Juarez, with several pull-offs to stop for pictures or a better view.



## T3: City of El Paso Neighborhood Association Origins

**Bus Tour/ Moderate Walking/ Historic neighborhood with limited wheelchair accessibility.**

The Manhattan Heights Neighborhood is centrally located in a historic district and built on a previous smelter company grounds. The copper company's smelter was demolished by 1912 to make way for the residential area. Most of the homes were completed in 1930. The houses were designed with wealthy buyers in mind. The houses, streets, and parks are kept well for its residents and delight for whoever likes to know the area and visit their iconic parks. In the heart of the district lies Memorial Park, a desert oasis, and the Municipal Rose Garden which showcases over 430 varieties of roses. Another jewel in the Manhattan Heights Neighborhood is the Loretto Academy that was built in the middle of nowhere and is now in Central-East El Paso. Designed by Gustavus Trost, the Academy is in excellent condition today. The building is in a Spanish renaissance style and features red Spanish Tile roofs with beautiful campus grounds that beautify the Manhattan Heights neighborhood.

## ▶ **T4: Our Partners in Education Tour**

**Bus Tour/ Moderate Walking/ Historic neighborhood with limited wheelchair accessibility**

The visit to the University of Texas in El Paso (UTEP) will inspire everyone who accepts this ride to the University campus. The University is enclaved in an iconic and historic neighborhood, The Sunset Heights Neighborhood. UTEP is a public research university and the second-largest University in the United States to have the majority Mexican American student population after the University of Texas Rio Grande Valley. The University has been distinguished because of its positive social and economic impact on the community and region it serves. In addition, the surrounding area of the University is a good match for students who enjoy city life. The Sunset Heights Neighborhood is the home of the University campus. The Sunset Heights Neighborhood is a historic area engulfed in 170 acres. Many wealthy residents have had their houses and mansions built on this hill. Although some buildings have been renovated to their former glory, others have deteriorated. The Sunset Heights Improvement Association helps neighbors on a fixed income manage home maintenance and sponsors an annual tour.

## ▶ **T5: Westside's Newest City Neighborhoods**

**Bus Tour/ Moderate Walking/ ADA Accessible**

The Franklin Mountains are the sleeping guardian of El Paso, dividing the City into two areas, The Eastside and the Westside. The Westside is distinguished for its economic, housing, and community-growing impact on the City. In addition, the Westside is where three states neighbor each other, El Paso, Texas; Sunland Park, New Mexico and Ciudad Juarez, Chihuahua, Mexico.

The area comprises the newest home developments, occupied mainly by couples and starting families. In addition, a few neighborhoods close to the El Paso border have been organized as Neighborhood Associations for the last 20 years. Traveling to the east of the area, the Franklin Mountains connect to the North eastside area of El Paso thru its Transmountain road. ## ▶ **T6: Northeast breathtaking neighborhoods at the foot of the Franklin Mountains**

**Bus Tour/ Moderate Walking/ ADA Accessible**

Because of its proximity to the military base called Fort Bliss, The Northeast neighborhoods hold most of the veterans' community population who decide to make El Paso their home and stay. As a result, El Paso has been proclaimed by County Judge Samaniego as the Veteran's Capital of the U.S.A. Additionally, the Northeast area is one of the more ethnically diverse areas of town due to a high concentration of enlisted military families. Some of the Northeast neighborhoods are close to the Franklin Mountains' foothills, with extensive open areas and trails to enjoy the El Paso desert scenery. In addition, the annual Poppies Festival is hosted in the area during the spring bloom. To the north of the area, it extends to the New Mexico State line.

## ➤ T7: Mission Valley Neighborhoods

**Bus Tour/ Moderate Walking/ Wheelchair accessible**

The Missions are an essential part of the history of our neighborhoods and region. The Spaniards including in their pilgrim routes, had Missionaries who entered thru once called Paso del Norte area ( now Ciudad Juarez). The established Missions are still active and used by El Pasoans and adjacent Towns' communities. Three Missions will be visited, Ysleta del Sur Mission, Socorro Mission, and San Elizario Mission. There is a lot of history behind every Mission and the neighborhoods where they are located. The Paso del Norte Trail connecting all three Missions is the only trail route along the Rio Grande river, which marks the U.S. border with Mexico.



## ➤ T8: Eastside Edge of El Paso

**Bus Tour/ Moderate Walking/ Wheelchair accessible**

The Eastside neighborhoods area is the fastest-growing area of town. With a population of over 150,000, east El Paso is also the largest area in the City. It also possesses the greatest number of entertainment venues in the City. In addition, there is a mix of historic, very active, and new neighborhoods in the Eastside area. A visit to the Beast Urban Park in Upper East El Paso boasts the region's first public indoor natatorium with a diving well and other amenities. In addition, the Eastside Public Transportation Station was recently inaugurated to use by the active commuters in the area.



## ➤ T9: Soul of El Paso Streetcar Tour

**Street Car/ Easy Walking/ Wheelchair Accessible**

El Paso Downtown Streetcar is one of the most outstanding amenities brought back in recent years. It uses a fleet of restored PCC streetcars that had served the City's previous system until its closure in 1974. The system covers 4.8 miles in two loops from Downtown El Paso to the University of Texas at El Paso. A small trolley cart was introduced to El Paso in 1902, replacing El Paso's mule car system, which had the town's pet, "Mandy the Mule," taking passengers across the border and around the downtown area. The streetcar will take you around El Paso Downtown to appreciate the beautiful revitalized downtown area, including the mix of historic and new buildings and hotels. The ride will get about three blocks closer to the Port of Entry to Juarez. Possible visit to one of the iconic historic hotels Downtown to hear the story behind the landmark hotel's magnificence.

The cities are separated by the thin trickle of the Rio Grande, which flows through concrete channels built to end the river's natural habit of changing course and muddying boundaries. Nevertheless, thousands of people from both sides commute daily for business, school, or leisure. The tour will help visitors understand the borderland life. The first stop will be at the Misión de Guadalupe, which marks the origins of the City. Then the region's economic success is mainly due to the success of the "maquilas" factories established specifically in Ciudad Juarez for the excellent and inexpensive labor compared to other Countries. Therefore, a visit to a Maquila will follow. After that visit, the drive will include going through neighborhoods before arriving at one of the exquisite Mexican cuisine restaurants to add to this fantastic Ciudad Juarez, Mexico-of-a-kind experience. Fee: Dinner stop in one of the iconic restaurants in Ciudad Juarez.

Street Car/ Easy Walking/ No Meal Included/ Wheelchair accessible

The Mariachi, a jewel of Mexican folklore music, will take over the El Paso Streetcar with a selection of its most beloved hits! The special performance by Mariachi Alegre will delight your ears while you enjoy the beauty of Downtown El Paso. The ride will loop through 4.8 miles of track and 27 stops through the most iconic neighborhoods of El Paso. Do not wait to sign up for a true Borderland Fiesta on the streetcar filled with joy and Mexican folklore!





## Did you know?

**Company E was the only all Mexican-American infantry unit with 250 soldiers during World War II and their ranks came from across the state of Texas – many from El Paso. There were 85 soldiers from El Paso's South Side neighborhood who had attended Bowie High School.**



The significance of Company E was in its unique, original composition of 100% Mexican American young men mostly from the barrios of El Paso, an intentional, pre-civil rights act of segregation designed to “Americanize” Spanish-American youths. Of greater significance is the outstanding bravery, camaraderie, and heroism displayed as the unit was the first in WWII to deploy into mainland Europe at Salerno, Italy and proceed to battles at Alta Villa, Mt. Rotondo, San Pietro, the Rapido River, and onward to the liberation of Rome. This magnificent sculpture by Julio Sanchez de Alba, depicts the treacherous crossing of the Rapido River, a prominent tribute to the patriotism and sacrifice of these men from El Paso whose legacy is one of pride, respect, and honor for them, for all our families, for El Paso, and for all Chicanos.
