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El Paso Museum of Art Opens *PAINT: Rachelle Thiewes* Exhibit Inspired by Lowrider Autopaint

The new exhibit highlights a body of work inspired by the vibrant colors of lowrider automotive paint often seen on lowriders throughout the Chihuahuan Desert region.

About the Artist

Rachelle Thiewes is a nationally and internationally recognized metalsmith whose sculptural jewelry can be found in over twenty permanent collections. Her work is displayed at the Metropolitan Museum of Art, The Art Institute of Chicago, the American Craft Museum, the Renwick Gallery at the Smithsonian, the Royal College of Art London, and more. Thiewes is also a celebrated educator of nearly four decades. She led the Metal Arts department at the University of Texas at El Paso, inspiring generations of artists in the Borderlands.

About the Exhibition

The art and design of Rachelle Thiewes challenges definitions within the domains of jewelry making and sculpture. Thiewes' work is focused on making the wearer conscious of their body and incorporates kinetic elements. *PAINT* showcases vibrant colors inspired by the Chihuahuan Desert region. The jewelry on display emulates the vivid palettes of lowriders, part of an important subculture in the Borderland. Working within the realm of art and adornment, her striking pieces express innovative uses of patinas and luminosity, all while exploring the cultural specificity of paint.
